## Bandits, four other teams, leaving AJHL

No AJHL teams have been suspended....

The hockey world was rocked on Saturday when the British Columbia Hockey League (BCHL) leaked that the Brooks Bandits and four other Alberta Junior Hockey League (AJHL) teams will move to the BCHL.

Brooks, Blackfalds Bulldogs, Okotoks Oilers, Sherwood Park Crusaders and Spruce Grove Saints will join the BCHL for the 2024-25 season.

The BCHL will increase to 22 teams and the AJHL will drop to 11 teams.

"The information wasn't supposed to be out until May 1," said Bandits president, Paul Seaton.

"Nothing has been signed yet but an agreement has been reached and our board has agreed to it unanimously," he said.

He said the decision to

change leagues was made "very recently" and that the five teams have not officially notified the league.

In a statement announcing the cancellation of games last weekend and three this week, the AJHL said they are assessing the next steps and schedule implications.

The cancelled games have been between teams leaving and teams remaining.

Four games were cancelled over the weekend including the one between Drayton Valley Thunder and the Bandits and the Whitecourt Wolverines and the Bandits.

The cancelled weekend games were removed from the master schedule.

"The league has taken certain actions I believe are outside their jurisdiction in that the game tonight (Saturday) and tomorrow night have been cancelled," said Seaton.

It's not known if the schedule will change to the end of the season, however, change may include continuing the season as scheduled or even removing the five teams from the schedule.

Seaton said he can't imagine it going that far.

"It's obviously going to be a legal question."

In addition to listing this week's cancellations, the AJHL appeared to respond to inaccurate social media posts which stated the five teams were "indefinitely suspended."

"The Alberta Junior Hockey League continues to operate as a member of the Canadian Junior Hockey League (CJHL) and has not suspended any of its 16 member teams," the league said on Monday.

"All games played have been league sanctioned under the management of the AJHL game officials and recorded in the league standings."

When asked for a comment on Saturday from the CJHL, president Andy Harkness told The Bulletin "There is no comment at this time."

Seaton said he cannot yet discuss the reason why the decision was made to leave the AJHL but the early announcement resulted in things going a little south.

"We're all a bit miffed. It's chaos at the moment but we'll have to see where the mop flops, I guess," he said.

The BCHL withdrew its membership from the Canadian Junior Hockey League in 2021 and in May 2023 it served notice of its withdrawal from Hockey Canada.

Hockey Canada continued to honour its agreement with the league until the withdrawal date of June 1, 2023.

The Bandits intent to operate within the AJHL for the current season expires on May 31, 2024. It is also anticipated that Hockey Canada will continue to honour its agreement with the five AJHL teams.

There would be some advantages to joining the BCHL, which is an independent league, including allowing teams

to recruit 16-and-17-yearold players from other provinces and allowing players to remain in Canada and compete in the NCAA. That option may be expanded for players under 18.

The BCHL structure will be announced over the next few months but it is believed there will be little change in travel.

Harold Evans, a long time Bandits fan, said he will continue to show team support and believes the move will mean more

competition.

"When you think of the travel, it's going to probably be more than it already is but it's probably a good move," he said.

"We're still going to be Brooks Bandits."

Kim Penner also agrees that changing leagues will mean better games for fans.

"People don't want to come to a game where they're winning 11-2," she said

"Now they're going to be playing with people who are

more their calibre. It'll be good for the boys."

Martin Shields, also a long time fan, said he hopes the team will continue to do well in Procks

well in Brooks.

"The level of play is excellent. As a fan, all you're hoping for is a continued level of team management and coaching and players that have been attracted to play in Brooks."

He said he's enjoyed watching the team, their development and growth and seeing them become a recognized name in Canada.

"That's because they are part of the Alberta Junior Hockey League. There's been lots of games played and lots of players who participated in AJHL. It's a great sport to watch," he said.

Brooks mayor John Petrie said all the mayors from the affected teams were caught off guard by the decision.

"Nobody saw that coming."

He said the change will not financially impact the city in terms of the arena agreement.

As a fan, he wonders what the affects will be.

"Certainly the travel costs will go up. Does that mean my ticket price goes up?"

The news and cancelled games overshadowed Bandits parent weekend.

Although there were no games the players did manage to put on a show with a three-on-three hockey competition and autograph session for the few hundred that were at the arena.

Rob McCall, father of Bandits defenceman Quinn McCall, travelled from Indiana.

"Parents weekend for us is all about seeing Quinn, seeing him in his environment, seeing him in his element with his hockey teammates and also getting to know the other parents. It's been great."

He said the on-ice talent is amazing.

"The change in not only Quinn's play but also his teammates play throughout the season has been great. McCall said, "Quinn

## SE Alberta chamber hoping to attract local businesses

There had been some difficult few years for the Brooks and District Chamber of Commerce, specifically during COVID, and a decline in members and finances over those years resulted in moving the office into city hall and later on members voted for dissolution.

Not wanting to leave businesses without representation, this area will become part of the rebranded Medicine Hat chamber, now known as the Southeast Alberta Chamber of Commerce.

During their AGM at the end of November the Med Hat Chamber agreed both the name and boundary changes.

In December, documents were filed with Corporations Canada and the Boards of Trade Act to expand their boundaries to include businesses in the city and county and to officially change the name.

There is a lot to do prior to the organization having a presence in the area.

The executive members told The Bulletin they want to return trust of the chamber to the community.

Letters are being sent to local businesses which will be followed by in-person meetings.

"The relationship is really important; building

trust in the community. We are truly here to help," said chamber executive director Lisa Dressler.

"We have slowly trickled our way in," said Becky Mae, member relations.

"We want to make sure that we're focusing on the relationships first," Dressler added.

Some changes that expected include disallowing elected officials to sit as board members but allowing them to serve as government liaisons on committees.

recommended "It's that chambers don't have government representatives of any kind on their board," said Ďressler.

"As an advocacy organization you need to be able to advocate to municipal, provincial federal levels

government."

She said board decisions are unified and if an elected official is a member, especially one that is part of an organization being lobbied by the chamber, it creates a conflict of interest.

"We have very much held that we don't have elected officials on our board."

That same reasoning is expected to be part of the decisions for the eventual relocation of the chamber office from city hall.

"We still have to have the conversation with the City of Brooks administration and council as to what the arrangements are.

"Certainly there's been an offer made but we want to make sure we go through the proper protocols in terms of what that looks like," Dressler said.

## People turned off by lack of TVs in hospital

Patients at Brooks Health Centre will soon hear the sweet sounds of television to help pass the time and to get some comfort.

Over the past few months the issue has been raised by patients and families that people have nothing to do while they're in the hospital.

The patient TVs were removed following the retirement of the TV Lady about a year ago.

Alberta Health Services (AHS) has provided TVs to the long term and sub-acute departments, however, AHS, "Isn't in the business of providing TVs in acute care but they do provide the cable," said Shauna James of the Brooks and District Health Foundation.

She said donations of TVs have also been made for the palliative care unit and a donation of TVs for all rooms is expected in the near future.





#### **Business Licence Fees Reinstated Deadline Extended to Feb 29**

During recent budget deliberations, Brooks City Council determined that business licence fees will be reinstated, effective immediately, utilizing the previous fee structure.

Business licence fees were temporarily eliminated in 2021 as a proactive response to the challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic. This initiative was aimed at providing crucial support to local businesses during a time of economic uncertainty.

Recognizing the unique circumstances, businesses have been granted an extension to pay their business licence fees until February 29, without incurring any penalty. Typically, invoices are distributed by the beginning of December and are due by December 31.

## Oilsands deserve our thanks and respect

Without doubt, it's the greatest industrial success story this country has enjoyed in the past half-century. That's probably why so many people would like to shut it down.

We're talking about the Alberta oilsands, which has repeatedly beaten overwhelming odds for more than a century to become the leading cumulative corporate contributor to provincial and federal tax coffers, thereby providing oodles of cash to support all types of social programs so many of us enjoy.

This is not something you dare mention in polite society, of course. Because the oilsands are dirty — pulling massive amounts of bitumen from the northern muskeg isn't an endeavour where white gloves are deemed de rigueur. So, the mining itself along with its eventual end product could in no way be tagged with some virtuous, green-energy badge of honour.

That's why a most notable milestone a few weeks ago was afforded barely a nod of recognition in this country. Even here in Alberta, it passed rather quietly.

According to the Alberta Energy Regulator, the province's oil production rose above four million barrels a day for the first time in November.

The vast majority of those 4.16 million daily barrels came from the oilsands, where companies are now ramping up production to fill the Trans Mountain pipeline expansion that's due to start up this year, providing capacity for another 590,000 barrels to export across the Pacific. (I'm not holding my breath, given that project's history. But in the oil business, fortune favours the brave.)

The upshot of this boost in production is that a single province in Canada (that being us) is now the fifth-largest oil producer in the world, after the U.S., Saudi Arabia, Russia and Iraq. Add in additional production from Saskatchewan and Newfoundland, and Canada moves into fourth place.

Yet, we are not proud of this. The energy industry is akin to that rogue uncle the family disowned long ago, but still insists on embarrassing everyone at every opportunity.

Having a soft spot for rogues, I consider the development of the oilsands — back in 1921 when Karl Clark began testing bitumen extraction methods at the U of A — as a wonderful Canadian success story: one that should be celebrated. It shows what can be done despite the challenging climate, the bruising politics of a vast, federated land and the inherent volatility of the energy business itself.

For a few years, the head honchos of the various oilsands businesses, encouraged by the Alberta government, would invite certain celebrities to visit Fort McMurray and tour their operations, hoping not for support but at least for some small word of understanding. All they got in return was dismissive condescension and ultimate condemnation.

Frankly, it served them right for pandering to such folk — let's face it, the CEO of Suncor won't be asked to tour Disney's studios in Burbank, Calif., to give his opinion about the latest adaptation of Snow White, so why should we care what Leonardo DiCaprio thinks about bitumen extraction?

Such bended-knee snivelling seems to have abated along with those embarrassing invitations to folk who think in situ must refer to some latest fashion trend or a potentially profitable property makeover.

The climate is changing: if I can use such a slightly naughty turn of phrase. Not in Hollywood, but across this country. Canadians haven't had a come-to-bitumen moment, but they have had a cost-of-living epiphany.

And suddenly, green policy is about as popular as that same colour on two-week-old cheddar.


Of course, such folk won't suddenly love the oilsands — finding it on a map is beyond their grasp — but at least they won't demand it be shuttered to somehow save the world.

So, raise a glass to Canada, Alberta and those men and women who believed for so long that this daunting resource could eventually be harvested to make all our lives better.

## TIME CAPSULE



#### **Routine Rockets**



Not all that long ago, attacking another country's territory was still seen as a big deal. It was, in legal terms, an 'act of war', liable to have unpleasant and potentially unlimited consequences including full-scale war. Very powerful countries occasionally made small, one-off at-tacks on very weak ones to 'discipline' them, but even that was relatively rare.

We have changed all that now. Launching a few cruise or ballistic missiles at another country as an expression of displeasure has become as routine in the Middle East as penalty shots on goal are in sports. Here are the latest examples.

Last Tuesday the United States and the United Kingdom made their first air strikes on Yemen, to punish the Houthi regime for attacking ships heading up the Red Sea towards the Su-ez Canal. Quite separately, Turkey made multiple air strikes against northern Also on Tuesday, Syria. launched missiles Iran into Pakistan's province of Balochistan (next to Iran's own province of the same name). This was a new departure, since Iran had never struck Pakistani territory before.

On Wednesday Iran launched missiles into the Kurdistan province of northern Iraq, claiming (implausibly) that they were eliminating an Israeli spy site.

On Thursday Pakistan launched rockets and suicide drones against alleged terrorists in Iran's border province of Balochistan, but it was really retaliating for Tuesday's Iranian missile attacks on Pakistan's own territory. And Jordan attacked targets in southern Syria. Something to do with drug trafficking, I think.

On Friday the United States and the United Kingdom made a second round of air strikes on northern Yemen including the coast. Israel and Hezbollah (which is part of Lebanon's government) traded missile and drone strikes across the border, as they do every day.

On Saturday, Israeli missiles killed five senior officers of Iran's Revolutionary Guard in Damascus, where they were acting as advisers to the Syrian army. Also five innocent bystanders. Can't be helped.

On the same day, a number of cruise and ballistic missiles hit the Al Asad airbase in Iraq, causing "traumatic brain injuries" to "an unspecified number of US military personnel" who were based there with the agreement of the Iraqi government. The group that launched the missiles were probably Iraqi citizens, but openly acknowledge their links with Iran.

Just another working week in the Middle East, and I'll have forgotten the details by next weekend. The players are all way past trigger-happy, and the reason is simple. There is no longer any serious penalty for acting crazy.

Yes, it's the Middle East, which has always been readier to use violence than the rest of the world, but even there they didn't used to act like this. None of these countries are actually at war with each other, but they are all using air and missile strikes to kill people in neighbouring countries with complete impunity.

That's what is driving this steep rise in targeted cross-border missile strikes: the complete impunity. If there is any retaliation, it will be tit-fortat at most, so if you want to

'send a message', what's to stop you? Nothing.

Why is this only happening now? Technology, mostly. The missiles are now very accurate, so you can be reasonably confident – not certain, mind you – that your strike will kill your in-tended target, but won't kill a lot of innocent people and give you a bad name.

Moreover, there's no longer any risk of having a pilot bail out and get captured, which used to be a serious disincentive to dropping high explosives on other countries. The hitech Western militaries started using these weapons on weaker countries as soon as they became avail-able – but now everybody in the Middle East has them, and they're all using them.

This is obviously not a good thing, but is it worth worrying about if you don't live in the Middle East? Not in the sense that it will inevitably spread to the rest of the world. The weapons have been widely available for at least a decade already, but there's no sign that they are being used with impunity elsewhere.

However, they certainly raise the risk of miscalculation and escalation in the Middle East, which fills the same role of 'cockpit of the world' that the Balkans did before the outbreak of the First World War. When you're launching missiles at somebody or other every week or so, it gets to be routine. You tend to forget what a huge risk you are taking.

Attacking another country, even if it's just to kill a few generals or a few 'terrorists', is a momentous act with potentially huge consequences. Israel and Pakistan already have nuclear weapons, and thanks to Donald Trump Iran is only a few baby steps away.

Missiles are a really poor way of sending messages to your enemies. Traditional diplomacy is a lot better.

Kirk and the voyages of the starship Enterprise, you'll be familiar with these words on the original Star Trek TV series that encapsulate its goal and mission. When actor William Shatner - who played Captain Kirk and became famous because of this role finally did go into space at age 90 on Jeff Bezos' Blue Origin space shuttle, he returned with a very different outlook on space and our planet. Instead of being exhilarated

felt profound "The contrast grief: between the vicious coldness of space and the warm nurturing of Earth below filled me overwhelming with sadness. Every day, we are confronted with the knowledge of further destruction of Earth at our hands: the extinction of animal species, of flora and fauna . . . things that took five billion years to evolve, and suddenly we will never see them again because of the interference of mankind. It filled me with dread. My trip to space was supposed to be a celebration; instead, it felt like a funeral." Similarly, when David penned the words of Psalm 8, he was struck by the dissonance between the importance God places on mankind in comparison to the rest of creation: "When I consider your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars, which you have set in place, what is mankind that you are mindful of them, human beings that you care for them?" We are so small and life here on earth as we know it is so unique and precious compared to the vastness of darkness and death which surrounds us that we can only marvel at the attention and love we receive from our Creator. Jesus the Son of God died, rose again, and ascended to the heavenly realm, in order that we may be restored to God's original design, reflecting His glory, and ultimately be the hope again instead of a curse for the rest of creation as well (Romans 8:19-

## Second coyote attack on Highway 1 confirmed

A second coyote attack has been confirmed by Brooks resident who witnessed the incident.

On Jan. 10 the man and his passenger, both of whom do not want to be identified,

## 25-years given to man who killed local family members

The man responsible for a collision in South Dakota that killed a Duchess mother and son in July 2022 was sentenced to 25-years in prison.

Ray Hurtado, **Iustin** pleaded no contest last October to vehicular homicide and vehicular battery.

On Nov. 16,. 2023 he was sentenced.

According to recently obtained court documents Hurtado, who was impaired at the time of the accident, was sentenced to 10 years in jail for vehicular battery and 15 years for vehicular homicide.

He was also ordered to pay over \$100,000 to the family of his wife, Veronica, who was a passenger in his vehicle and died one month after the crash.

There is no restitution notice for the family in Duchess contained in the documents. Bulletin has learned that part of the records are

On July 3, 2022 Hurtado was driving about one mile east of Colome, SD when his truck crossed the centre line and crashed into the truck that being driven by Kyle Larson of Duchess and which was pulling a cattle trailer.

Kyle's wife, Darsey, 40, and son Koye, 14, died.

Kyle was airlifted with life-threatening injuries and has since recovered.

Hurtado has had multiple driving-related offences. In the last five years he was cited and pleaded guilty seven times for driving with a suspended licence in counties across south Dakota.

The second annual Koye Larson Memorial Rodeo is tentatively scheduled to be held at the Centennial Regional Arena on May 10 and 11.

#### Commercial B&E in **Duchess**

The Duchess convenience store was broken into last week and the suspects got away with a large haul of items.

RCMP reported that three suspects, two males and one female, entered the retailer through a broken window on Jan. 18 at 5:45 a.m.

They stole a large amount of tobacco products, vaping equipment and lottery tickets.

"The suspects left in a vehicle but no description of the vehicle has been obtained yet," RCMP said in a press release.

"Police collected CCTV and evidence on scene which is being processed to identify the suspects. The investigation is ongoing.

Don't leave running

vehicle unattended

Police found vehicles that were running were also unattended and could have easily been

Brooks RCMP took part in Operation Cold Start, a province-wide program to inform the public of the risks, including theft, when leaving a running vehicle unattended in cold temperatures.

Between Jan. 8 and Jan. 12 local RCMP located about 105 running vehicles and while some had been started remotely about 50 were found with the keys inside, running and unattended.

Most of the unattended vehicles were unlocked which can easily provide the opportunity for a thief to slip in and a drive away.

"We understand the need to have your vehicle warmed up and thawed out, however, all preventative measures to

protect it from being stolen should be taken," RCMP stated in a press release.

In Brooks last year there were 37 vehicles stolen which was a decrease of eight over the previous year.

The latest statistics from the county and Bassano show there were 13 vehicles stolen in the county and three in the Bassano detachment area which includes Rosemary.

Truck catches fire

Police report that there were obvious signs of impairment.


#### Intoxicated dispute, failing to comply with an order

## Cassils railway crossings to be repaired

The county agreed to cover their share of the costs of rail crossing

replacements at Cassils.

Canadian Pacific Kansas City Railway (CPKC) informed the county of the need to upgrade two crossings in Cassils at Range Road 154 and Range Road 155 from timber to concrete.

The costs for maintenance crossing at RR 155 are subject to a federal government order that was made in 1973 after a request by the county was granted by CP to install an additional track at the grade.

That county will be responsible for half the costs, \$223,690.

While the costs for the crossing at Range Road

154 are the responsibility of the rail company, CPKC requested half the costs from the county, \$113,956 to allow for a concrete upgrade.

Had the county refused, CP would have replaced the timber in the crossing.

Mark Harbicht, the county's director of municipal services, told council that railway

crossings containing timber are failing at the point where the pavement and timber meet due to vibrations or movement from trains and vehicles.

Crossings with concrete panels are not showing signs of this type of failure, he said.

The work is expected to be completed by the end of

## County's to seek \$29,000 from province for uncollectable taxes

The county will make its annual request to the province to cover the unpaid education and industrial tax from companies that are no longer in business.

The program was established in 2017 - but included 2015 and 2016 to provide municipalities with an education property tax credit that is equal to uncollectable taxes

on delinquent oil and gas properties.

The program was to conclude in 2021 but was extended to 2023.


The county's Education Provincial Requisition is \$22,880.42 bringing the total amount requested to \$265,442.43 since it's first application in 2017.

The 2023 Designated Industrial Tax request is \$1,112.29 which would bring that total to \$6,217.75

since the county started

applying in 2021. "The advan advantage writing off these balances on a yearly basis allows the county to recognize the uncollectable funds in the year they are levied, as opposed to letting a balance accumulate and then having to write-off multiple years at one time," Shannon Biette, the county's corporate services supervisor told council at their last meeting.

## Research and initiatives would be welcome... admitting the emission reality would be a good start

columns Previous mentioned that mitigating forest fires is perhaps the most significant factor in reduc-ing Canadian and even global emissions. But it seems like addiction issues; the need is first to admit that a real problem exists. Since Canada and the rest of the world do not formally include wildfire stats in calculating shares of global emissions, that first step is not likely. One notes that the green left is quick to blame climate change for the increase in wildfires but provides no practical ideas on how to reduce their incidence. It would seem their wildfire resolution is that if fossil fuels were eliminated,

temperatures would drop, and we would return to a previous idyllic time when forest fire emissions were of little consequence. However, history tells us that massive forest and range fires raged across Canada during those idyllic times when fossil fuel use barely existed compared to today. One of the largest of such fires occurred in 1913 when a forest fire that began in Idaho was finally extinguished almost two years later in the Athabasca area of Alberta. Did climate change start that fire? I think not, but its spread was not controllable through any human abilities at the time. We do have those abilities today, but even then, it's been an incremental process.

I mentioned that a large dedicated national air force of modern water bombers would significantly im-pact the length and severity of forest fires in Canada. But politically, that is not likely to happen,

as for-est fire management is a provincial responsibility. Such an air force would face an already existing fi-nancial problem - water bombers and allied aircraft and pilots are only needed for around four months of the year. Perhaps what might help is if forest fires were detected earlier before they get out of control and are much harder to deal with. That's not a new idea at one time, numerous forest fire lookouts were built across the country - the idea being that fires could be detected earlier in remote areas. Those lookouts were eventually superseded by helicopter and plane patrols over vast forested areas.

One presumes that was an improvement over lookout towers, but it would be more costly and subject to costsaving measures. I suspect aircraft could not be used in low-cloud and inclement weather when fire-causing

lightning strikes are more likely to occur. Satellites have become incredibly sophisticated, but can they penetrate enough through clouds and storms to detect fires in a timely manner? Perhaps there is an evolving technology that can be the next step in early fire detection.

That technology would be the use of drones instead of helicopters. The level of technical sophistica-tion of drones is such that they could be GPS programmed to operate at much lower altitudes and at times that are impossible for helicopters. Cost-wise, they could also operate more often and with in-frared, smoke and temperature sensors, would probably detect fires sooner than what is done at pre-sent. I expect that using drones for fire detection is already known in the forest fire control industry. Drones are already used in a multitude

of sectors, like surveying, crop scouting, wildlife conservation, and even looking for missing persons. Commercial drone companies would be well organized to en-gage in large-scale fire detection programs. I believe the same drone technology could also be used in aerial pipeline inspections.

But alas, I believe drone usage is being restricted and frustrated by that usual plague of that Canadian disease - federal bureaucratic intransigence and obstruction. I am to understand that regulations re-quire that drones must operate within line of sight and cannot operate under computer control alone. I suggest those regulations are quite outdated, and considering the military experience with drones, existing control technology is more advanced than many realize. However, that would

not sway regu-lators who are more interested in maintaining bureaucratic control and power. But I digress.

What would be interesting to know is at what level are governments engaging with developments in forest fire control technology like drones. Surely, research is going on to find better ways to detect fires early somewhere in Canada. I understand California extensively researches forest fire detection and control from several angles. One would expect that Canada, the forest fire capital of the world, would have an even more robust forest fire research program - one that is coordinated at a national scale - or is that all wishful thinking?

### Four per cent decrease in Brooks fire department callouts

**Brooks** department responded to fewer calls last year than the year before while seeing but saw an increase in fire code infractions.

The annual fire services review was presented to city council on Monday by Brooks fire chief Kevin Swanson.

Between Jan. 1 and Dec.

31, 2023 the Brooks fire department responded to 465 calls, a decrease of 20 calls from the previous year.

Of the calls, 333 were within the city and 132 were within the county.

There were 28 motor vehicle collisions in the city in 2023 which was down from 44 the previous year.

In Divisions 5 and 10, which includes the Highway, TransCanada there were 37 collisions which were down from 46

the previous year.

Councillor complimented Wardrop fire department's staff retention program which allows firefighters to purchase \$1,000 on firefighting personal equipment every three years.
