Smith confronts citizen at town hall in Brooks

Premier and Brooks-Medicine Hat MLA Danielle Smith avoided a confrontation regarding a question during her town hall meeting on Friday in Brooks.

An unidentified man said that every Canadian politician is "avoiding like the plague" the issue of mass immigration because it coincides with crime rates and the tax burden.

"You know we're all avoiding the question. Let's tackle the question what are you doing about it?" he asked.

Smith said the federal government allowed 1.8 million people into Canada in 2023 which is four times higher than the normal absorption rate.

During the last premiers' meeting consensus was given to have the federal government return to more normal immigration levels.

"We just can't do it anymore," she said.

The unidentified man said that immigration should stop because Canada is overburdened but he would like to see the premier's plan to double the population include a policy to "encourage birth rates among white Canadians because they're at all time lows, right?

To which the 100 or so attendees at the town hall responded with a quiet

gasp. "This is a very diverse Smith community," Smith responded without taking the bait before moving on to the next question.

Smith also discussed the housing situation in Brooks after being updated by mayor John Petrie.

"Brooks isn't just succeeding but thriving in its current climate," she said.

She was told that there is an increase in construction of rental units, new homes and other housing.

Smith also attended St. Joe's Catholic School where she heard loud and clear that it needs to be on the school construction priority list.

She said the school board has identified the new site (the old rodeo grounds park).

"They've got the support of council," she said.

"I don't want to prejudge where, how that zoning debate is going to go on Monday (Oct. 21) but I sure hope they manage to get to the finish line on approving it because what we have said is that if we can get the municipalities to agree to have all of the permits in place, all of the servicing the site, we want to prioritize those projects.

"I hope to be able to report some good news on that when we're back down again.

Smith was told that

there's 30 businesses in the area of park land "because it's more of an industrial area.

She said the development would allow for more students to be involved in the registered apprenticeship program while allow the school board to build a soccer field.

A teacher from Christ the King Academy encouraged Smith to build a new school.

One person said the problem with the site is that it's on a trucking route and "we're more worried about the kids, I think, on that road. It's causing congestion and big trucks."

John de Jong, a Catholic school board member said "safety is not going to be an issue

"Hopefully, there's plenty of room for parking in the area," he said.

Smith said she doesn't have a placement on the priority list of new schools yet and it won't be there until the land decision is made.

"That's kind of that last piece about whether council will zone it," she said.

"If anyone feels strongly about it, just know that there there's likely to be a decision of council next week that will be the last hurdle I think in coming to us," she said.

Community members are not against a new school, just the location.

The school wants to have the property in place so they can go to the province with a confirmed piece of land to receive funding. A municipality is responsible to provide land and because the old rodeo grounds property is owned by the city, council agreed rather than purchasing a more appropriate parcel, such as, near the French school.



COMMENT PBO confirms carbon tax costs more than rebates

The Canadian Taxpayers Federation is calling on the federal government to scrap its carbon tax following today's Parliamentary Budget Officer report confirming the carbon tax costs average households more than they get back in rebates.

"Once again the PBO confirms the carbon tax costs average families hundreds of dollars more than they get back in rebates," said Franco Terrazzano, CTF Federal Director. "This PBO report proves that politicians' favourite talking point is incorrect and it proves the carbon tax is making life harder for Canadians."

The Trudeau government claims "families are going to be better off" with its carbon tax and rebates. However, today's PBO report shows the carbon tax costs average households more than they get back.

"The average household in each of the backstop provinces will see a net cost, paying more in the federal fuel charge and GST, as well as receiving

lower incomes (due to the fuel charge), compared to the Canada Carbon Rebate they receive," according to the PBO.

The carbon tax will cost the average household up to \$399 this year more than the rebates. The table below shows the net federal carbon tax costs for the average household in each province, according to the PBO.

The PBO also noted that, "Canada's own emissions are not large enough to materially impact climate change."

The government also charges its GST on top of the carbon tax. The PBO report shows this carbon tax-on-tax will cost taxpayers \$400 million this year. That money isn't rebated back to Canadians.

"It's simply not credible to believe the government can impose a carbon tax, skim some money off the top, charge its sales tax on top of the carbon tax and then make families better off," Terrazzano said. "Prime Minister Justin Trudeau should take this PBO report as a wake-up call and scrap the carbon tax to make life more affordable."

'Remigration': the word had a harmless origin, as a term academics used to describe the phenomenon of migrants who failed to thrive in their new home and decided to go back to their birth country.

Then about ten years ago French nationalists and racists started using it to mean forcible repatriation of legal immigrants. However, it didn't catch on beyond the narrow circle of conspiracy theorists who subscribed to the 'great replacement' myth (the paranoid belief that there is a systematic plot to replace white people with non-white immigrants).

This year the term achieved lift-off, especially in the German-speaking parts of Europe. First the far-right 'Alternative for Germany' party (AfD) openly debated the policy of 'remigration' at a conference in Potsdam last winter. And last month the Freedom Party, which bluntly calls for the expulsion of immigrants, won the Austrian election.

The AfD ranks second in popularity in German opinion polls, but if there were an election today none of the many other parties in the fragmented German political scene would make a coalition with it.

Moreover, its support comes mainly from former east Germans who effectively lived under Russian rule for 45 years after the Second World War and have no tradition of living with immigrants. Before that they voted for Adolf Hitler in the fateful 1933 election – but western Germany has more than three times as many

people, and very few of them vote AfD.

Austria has only a tenth of Germany's population, but it was Hitler's birthplace and what eventually became the Freedom Party was founded in 1956 by ex-Nazis including former SS officers. It is Austria's biggest party after this election, but with only 29% of the seats in Parliament it needs to find coalition partners.

That may not be easy, especially if the Freedom Party insists that its leader, Herbert Kickl, becomes the prime minister. (Party members call him 'Volkskanzler', Hitler's old title.)

Under Kickl, the Freedom Party wants to add a clause to the constitution saying that Austria must protect itself against the European Union, the World Health Organisation and the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change. (Like almost all extreme right-wing parties, the Freedom Party's members are ultra-nationalist, anti-vaxxer, and climate change deniers.

Freedom's key offer is to withdraw citizenship from refugees who fail to integrate and simply to abolish the right to asylum. This may be extreme enough to force the other parties into a clumsy anti-Kickl coalition, but even if he becomes prime minister the heavens will not fall.

The Freedom Party has already served in two previous coalition governments, and no drastic changes ensued. Most Austrians still think EU membership is too valuable to give up, and EU rules forbid the anti-democratic measures Kickl seeks. For the moment, at least, Austria remains a law-abiding country. Indeed, this equation still restrains all the hard-right parties in the EU. Even Viktor Orbán's explicitly anti-EU regime in post-democratic Hungary does not quit the EU, although it regularly condemns

it. The notion of enforced 'remigration' has become common currency in right-wing discourse in Europe, but it is still just talk.

The real threat to this status quo is global warming. The far right may not believe in climate change, but it may deliver them to power nevertheless. As the floods, landslides, heatwaves and droughts get more extreme in Africa and the Middle East, a human wave of climate refugees will start moving towards the EU's southern and eastern borders.

At least one billion people live within reach of those borders by road or by sea.

That's twice as many as live within the EU, and almost all of them will be experiencing more brutal weather than the relatively fortunate Europeans. If only one in a hundred of those people decide to seek refuge in the European Union, that's ten million people banging on the door.

But it's not a door. Even now, long tracts of the EU's external borders are fenced and guarded, while the sea frontiers are patrolled by ships whose unwritten task is to stop wouldbe migrants in boats even if some of them die as a result.

It is not widely understood that Europe's borders with North Africa and Western Asia are already policed much more ruthlessly than the southern borders of the United States or the even the northern sea frontiers of Australia. This will only get more severe as the climate gets more extreme.

'Remigration' is just a symptom. One day, probably within a decade or so, Herbert Kickl's loose talk about 'Festung Europa' (Fortress Europe) will become a reality.

The only way to avert that is by huge and rapid cuts in emissions plus geoengineering measures to hold the heat down. And how likely is that?

But of course they meant something a little different. A sacred cow is something we create and attach more significance to than is appropriate. The Psalms were the ancient hymnbook of the people of Israel, and they allow for a wide spectrum of worship. Appropriate for us as people who experience a wide spectrum of emotion and life circumstance.

Is it wrong to have

environment of an reverence? No. Is it wrong to have an environment of celebration and joy? No. Church services need to create space for both, as well as other realities of life. Especially if you want parents with small children to feel welcome.

It is certainly more difficult to do. It is easier to pick one way of doing things and then always do that. But just because something is difficult does not mean it should not be done.



That's a lot of production compared to Canada – where national potato acreage is around 390,000, with 80,000 in Alberta. Alberta recently became the largest potato producer, surpassing Manitoba and PEI. The latter province markets its fresh potatoes as being better due to its red sandy soil. Idaho claims its spuds are better because they are grown in volcanic soils. Be that as it may, most spuds nowadays are processed into french fries and potato chips, where potato variety is more important than where they are grown. In the early days, most potatoes were marketed into the fresh market or freeze-

dried into flakes for instant mashed potatoes. Some of the big have processors developed their own proprietary potato varieties to improve the products they produce. For instance potato chip processors have developed a rounder potato to improve chip size processing and with less sugar content to reduce dark chips. As expected, the Idaho potato growing area is home to the biggest potato processors in the world like McCains, Lamb Weston, Lays and Simplot. The latter is a family operation that includes 82,000 acres of potato land. At one time, they shipped 10,000 railway boxcars of potatoes all over the USA. They are also famous for a deal they made with MacDonalds in 1973 to make them their largest

the USA. The french fry processing business is

supplier of french fries in

based primarily on the Russet Burbank (also called netted gem) variety of potato. It's a long, elongated spud that is ideal for french fries. That potato and its variations are also the main variety used in Alberta potato production. At McDonald's insistence, and they are the big dog buyer, no GMO potatoes are grown. There is no basis in science for that demand; it's strictly a PR marketing strategy. The naïve consumer would be unaware that a perfectly safe GMO potato would reduce the use of millions of tons of pesticides and herbicides worldwide. But I digress. The Potato precisely Museum portrays the evolution of potato planting and harvesting over the past 100 years. In the early days, potato farming was a back-breaking business that was very labourintensive. Machinery was rudimentary at best and saw potatoes being graded and bagged by

hand in the field and later being loaded by hand onto railway cars. That restricted anv significant expansion of potato growing, but relief was on the way as clever inventors and engineers designed efficient more ever large-scale planting and harvesting machinery. Today, commercial potato growers in North America are high-tech leaders using computerimage grading, fully automated handling and drones for disease and pest detection.

One cute display in the museum featured the world's largest potato crisp (a pringle chip). As admirable as that was, it twists the unfortunate reality that the USA, from personal testing experience, cannot produce a superior, flavourful potato chip. That honour goes to Miss Vickies original potato chips made right here in Taber, Alberta. It boggles the mind that as

sophisticated as the US is in food science and competitive product development, it cannot create the best potato chip in the world. To be fair, the potato chip world is dominated by the giant American Frito-Lay global snacks empire, which also produces the legendary Miss Vickie chips from Canada. I expect in time that superior chip will take over the world.

Finally, the Potato Museum had an attached potato restaurant which cooked up perhaps the finest french fries I had ever tasted outside of iconic MacDonalds fries. It was a good day at the Idaho Potato Museum, much better the than inferior french fry museum in pompous Bruges, Belgium. 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


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Mayor discusses wastewater future with provincial minister

Brooks mayor Iohn Petrie told city councillors last week that the city is limited on how much it can grow based on wastewater limitations.

week's During last Alberta Municipalities convention Petrie had a preliminary meeting with Ric McIver, minister of municipal affairs to discuss where to go next.

'We are good for a while vet but a new wastewater facility will be needed and they certainly do not come cheap," Petrie told council.

"That's certainly something council will have to look at.

Over the past few years presentations have been made to city council regarding wastewater with options upgrades including a mechanical system which would replace the current lagoons and an organic system which would require a new lagoon to filter the water through plants and other organic vegetation.

Petrie told The Bulletin that the current system is good until the population reaches about 17,000. The city's population is hovering at 15,000 mark.

Petrie said the meeting with McIver was to discuss grant applications and a where-we-go-from-here scenario. The estimated \$29 million cost would be too much of a burden for municipal taxpayers.

Petrie said the idea would be to construct a new facility to accommodate the population 40-50 years into the future.

During the convention Petrie also attended a session on the importance of reducing the daily consumption of water.

He said the idea discussed is to drop the daily amount to 195 litres per day with a goal of 175 litres per day per person.

"Calgary had to go through this when they went through some of their water problems in reducing their water consumptions,' he said.

He said ways to reduce consumption include education and reducing leakage.

Councillor Ray Juska, who also attended the session added that another drought was expected this year but the idea of conservation went into the queue when the area started to receive rain

"There's nothing saying that it's not going to get dry again," he said.

"It's something that we should always bear in mind and there's financial repercussions," he said.

Juska noted some dos and don'ts from other communities, such as reusing storm water, conservation rebates, outdoor watering schedules ensuring while that monitoring water doesn't cost money.

County OKs recreation agreements with Duchess council and ag society

The county has signed recreation agreements with the Village of Duchess and the Duchess Agricultural Society which will result in a significant funding increase.

The agreement with the village replaces the previous document that expired in 2023 while the agreement with the ag society is new.

The agreement with both organizations includes an automatic one year renewal, it gives the Duchess recreation, parks and culture board the authority to consider ag society capital budget requests and reporting requirements are to be aligned with those that are required under recently

approved agreements while adding a five-year capital plan. The previous agreement

that was signed in 2020 included capital funding of \$59,000 for indoor athletic field, outdoor playgrounds and walking trails, \$55,950 matched by the village for the ag society, a \$5,000 matched contribution as the base budget for rec, parks and culture board. It also included a two per cent increase each year.

The county and village had agreed to each pay 50 per cent of capital expenditures for recreation facilities and 50 per cent each for capital costs less any fundraising or grants by the ag society.

will see the county pay \$80,000 for recreation in 2024 and \$5,415 to the recreation board which is to be matched by the village.

The ag society had been a part of the original recreation agreement but it was decided to separate the organization from the village.

The ag society must provide a five year capital plan as part of their reporting. The agreement includes an automatic oneyear renewal, annual capital funding commitment of one-third from the county, village and the society up to a maximum of \$60,000 per group and it allows the society to consider capital requests from the recreation board.


clients in their business affairs, he will equally be known as a prankster who was uniquely able to bring levity to any situation.



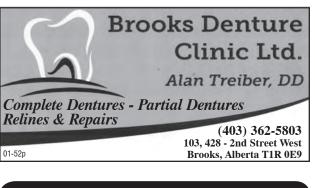



Once abundant across North America, little brown bat populations have declined due to disease and collisions with wind turbines.

Kinds of bats

Scientists divide bats into two groups — megabats and microbats. Megabats are also known as fruit bats or flying foxes. Megabats generally have big eyes and excellent eyesight. Most do not rely on echolocation to find food; they eat fruit and nectar. Because megabats are not found in the Americas, they are sometimes called Old World bats.

Microbats are smaller and eat mostly insects. They have big ears and small eyes, and they rely on echolocation to find food. Exploring the realms of history, science, nature and technology

Unlike most bats

that give birth to one pup, the eastern red bat often gives birth to up to five young.

There are more than 1,000 species of bats, 40 of which live in North America. The only mammal that can fly, bats come in many shapes and sizes. Sometimes feared in Western cultures, the bat is a symbol of long life and happiness in China and Japan. Many bats provide a valuable service to people by eating large quantities of destructive or annoying insects.

Habitat

Most bats like to live in dark places, like caves, tree or rock crevices, and sometimes in buildings. They tend to live in large colonies. At dusk, they leave the roost and head for favorite feeding grounds.

All in the family

Pregnant bats leave their regular roosts to join a special nursing colony. Bats usually give birth once a year, and most species give birth to just one baby at a time.


A baby bat is called a **pup**. Bats are born bald and with their eyes closed. Most bats nurse for about six to eight weeks before heading into the outdoors for food.

> Bats are nocturnal and spend their days sleeping.

Anatomy

Most bats have fur or hair, and they come in a variety of colors. Some people think their bodies look very mouselike. Bats digest food more quickly than many animals. This helps them maintain an ideal flying weight.

Bat wings are so thin that blood flowing through the veins can sometimes be seen. Bat ears twitch constantly, even when the bat is sleeping. A bat s hands are also its wings. Long fingers support strong, elastic membranes. There is a claw on the thumb.



Echolocation

Most bats have excellent eyesight, and many (mostly insect-eaters) use sound to find food. The bat emits a high-pitched sound from its nose or mouth. As the sound bounces off objects, the bat is able to determine exactly where the object is, even when it is moving. This is called **echolocation**. Most of the sounds that bats make are so high that the human ear cannot hear them. Some dolphins also use echolocation to find food. Modern radar equipment is based on the same principle.

to help catch prey.

The **flying fox bat** is the world's largest bat. It has a wingspan of up to 5 ft. (1.5 m). There are about 65 of this bat species found on tropical islands from Madagascar to Australia and Indonesia, as well as mainland Asia.



The world's smallest mammal, the **bumblebee bat** is found in western Thailand and southeastern Myanmar.

Hardwicke's woolly bat is native to Asia and has been known to roost in pitcher plants.

Hibernation

Bats that live in colder climates **hibernate** or **migrate** in winter. Many North American bats hibernate in caves. Hibernation is a state of deep sleep, during which the bat s heart rate slows and its body temperature drops. Some bats migrate to warmer climates. Tropical bats do not need to hibernate, but they have been known to migrate.

Did you know?

Bats are strong, skilled flyers and have been known to reach speeds of up to 60 mph (97 kph).

About 70% of bats eat insects and can eat half their weight in mosquitoes in one night.

There are three bat species that drink blood. The **common vampire bat** favors the blood of cattle and other domestic livestock, while the **hairy-legged** and **white-winged** vampires feed on bird blood.

Hawks and owls are the main predators of bats. Opossums, raccoons and skunks will eat bats that have fallen to the ground.

Almost 40% of North American bats are threatened or endangered. This is due to habitat loss and pesticides that find their way into the food chain. Some are killed as pests, and in some places, people eat fruit bats.
