'Disheartening mess' left in church break and enter

Parking concerns lead to three multi-unit denials in Brooks

Housing continues to be an issue in the city and while multi-unit housing proposals have been presented to the Municipal Planning Commission (MPC) many of the applications have been denied due to the lack of parking.

Over the past few weeks MPC has approved two applications for attached housing (townhouse-style). They have denied a third townhouse as well as two eight-plexs all in the area of Second Avenue near the Quad ball diamond.

"Some of the applications

are nonsensical to some degree," said MPC chairman Fred Rattai.

An application was proposed with tandem parking where two vehicles would share one space but it results in one vehicle being unable to move until the other vehicle is moved.

"It tends to head you towards parking wars," he

Rattai said applications are looking to put the most units on the property that is available.

"That's understandable in the financial world but it's not a reality when you're talking residential neighbourhoods continue to have a parking

situation."

Other applications that have been presented were for six units with five stalls.

"At this point nearly every multi-family dwelling that goes down there is just exacerbating a situation that's been bad and is going to get worse," he said.

He said there has been a clash in the area by people purchased single family homes but now see multifamily homes being built in front or around them and restricting their parking.

"There's problems with parking no matter where you go. Councillor Bill Prentice and I have been

on parking committee and signage committee. It was a problem 10 years ago but it's exacerbating by the fact you've got limited space available to build housing,"

However, by denying the applications, Rattai said, the applicant will work with the city to try and come up with

They can go back to the city and work with planning and deal with garbage pick up and lane access," he said.

While the city has been focusing on the ball diamond area for housing Rattai said there are other areas, such as the old rodeo grounds that might be

better suited.

However, residents have said they don't want housing on that piece of land. They want it to remain recreational. The city has since given the land to the Catholic School board.

Rattai said there is other land available for housing in the city such as a property along 3rd Street West that has been for sale for more than a decade.

"It might have to be rezoned," he said.

"I think the city has to develop a list of available property and promote that to the builders," he said.

Rattai believes the city has to consciously work

towards developing, finding or promoting land that is available for housing and present that to builders who are willing and able to

build in the community.

Although the project has been approved, Rattai believes there will be a parking strain in front of the post office when the 43-unit apartment is finished because it isn't limited to one car per unit.

"A lot of the parking regulations were set out when there wasn't such a demand for housing and people didn't have every kid in the family with a car.

"Easements concessions do not create more parking stalls.

"It's very overwhelming. It's not me that I want to promote. It's the program." said Hunter, who learned that she had won the honour on her 76th birthday. Hunter is being recognized for introducing Dress a Girl Around the World to southern Alberta.

Operated through Hope 4 Women International, Dress a Girl provides handmade dresses to girls living in

"The main goal for me is just getting word out there about this program so that we can get more people involved and hopefully get groups to start on their own," she said.

"When it was first suggested that I be nominated, I wasn't too crazy about the idea because to me it's more about what we are doing," she said.

The program was introduced to Brooks in February 2024 and since then 257 dresses have been sewn, 112 have been shipped and seamstresses have been busy in Rolling Hills, Brooks and Hays.

"We've been sewing dresses and sending them overseas. We've sent some to the Philippines, Eswatini (formerly Swaziland) and Samaritan's Purse in Calgary who put them into the shoeboxes and send them to where they are the most needed."

Jake Eckert In 2018 at the age of 89 was published.

Eckert's story, which was told to Elsie Loewen who wrote the book, chronicles his Mennonite family's history of fleeing persecution, violence, and tyranny.

Eckert said he was overwhelmed and surprised when he learned that he had won the award.

"I'm beyond speech. I never thought about it," he

daughter Lillian His Duenk said while she and her brothers were growing up they each heard bits and pieces of their father's story but each was slightly different and out of order.

That's how it started," he

Eckert was born in Siberia, Blagoveschensk, Russia on Sept. 7, 1929.

"They started persecuting people who were not of Russian descent

hardship," said Eckert.
"They endured quite a few years. They couldn't go to the west, like to Europe, because the borders were closed."

In December 1930 his family along with all 216 villagers joined the Exodus from their Mennonite settlement in eastern Siberia to China escaping across the frozen Amur River.

Over the next 20 years Eckert was immersed in China including the customs and friends as well as short stint in the Red Army.

At the age of 20, Jake,

and two sisters left China for Canada. The family arrived in Bassano by train in 1951 staying at Jake's uncle Cornelius Eckert's farm in Rosemary.

Their father was taken by Russians in 1945.

"My father had planted the dream of bringing his family to a land of freedom - and he was the only one to miss reaping its benefits," he wrote.

Years later the family had found that his father had been 'forcibly repatriated'. He had died in Kazakhstan.

Final Day of Yard Waste Collection

The last week for yard waste collection is coming up. From October 28 to November 1, 2024, make sure to set out your yard waste bins for pickup. After this week, collection will stop for the season.

Fall Yard Waste Clean Up

Public Works will be conducting the final Fall Yard Waste Clean Up starting on Monday, November 4, and continuing through November 8. This cleanup will not take place on your normal yard waste pickup day.

- All residential yard waste must be out by 7:00 AM on Monday, November 4 for collection.
- Yard waste must be in compostable paper bags or clear recycle bags—not your compost bin.
- Yard waste includes grass clippings, leaves, garden debris, and small branches up to 1/4" in diameter (small branches must be securely bundled).

Place your items in the same location as your scheduled yard waste pick up, within 5 feet of the front road or back lane. Please ensure your items do not block sidewalks or traffic.

All City facilities will be closed on October 14th except for the JBS Canada Centre, which will be open from 12:00 PM-6:00 PM.

Trudeau's proposed 'electricity' regulations may leave Canadians out in the cold

In case you haven't heard, the Trudeau government has proposed a new set of "Clean Electricity Regulations" (CERs) to purportedly reduce the use of fossil fuels in generating Basically, electricity. CERs would establish new standards for the generation of electricity, limiting the amount of greenhouse gases that can be emitted in the process, and would apply to any unit that uses fossil fuels (coal, natural gas, oil) to generate electricity.

The CERs would hit hardest provinces that rely on fossil fuels to generate electricity: Alberta (89% fossil fuels), Saskatchewan (81%), Nova Scotia (76%) and New Brunswick (30%). Not so much Ontario (7%) and Quebec (1%), which are blessed with vast hydro potential.

In theory, the government has been in "consultation" with electricity producers and the provinces that will be most impacted by the CERs, although some doubt the government's sincerity.

For example, according to Francis Bradley, CEO of Electricity Canada, which advocates for electricity companies, there "insufficient time to analyze provide feedback could meaningfully that the regulatory impact design" adding that the "engagement process has failed to achieve its purpose." consequently, current design of the CERs may impose "significant impairments to the reliability of the electricity system and severe affordability impacts in many parts of the country."

This was not the first time folks observed a lack of meaningful consultation over the CERs. Earlier this year, Alberta Environment Minister Rebecca Schulz CBC an update the CERs made "no meaningful corrections to the most destructive piece Canadian electricity regulation in decades" and that CERs "would jeopardize

reliability and affordability of power in the province."

Simply put, with CERs the Trudeau government is gambling with high stakes — namely, the ability of Canadians to access reliable affordable electricity. Previous efforts at decarbonizing electrical systems in Ontario and around the world suggest such efforts are relatively slow to develop, are expensive, and are often accompanied by periods electrical system destabilization.

In Ontario, for example, while the provincial removed government coal-generation from its electricity generation from 2010 to 2016, Ontario's residential electricity costs increased by 71%, far outpacing the 34% average growth in electricity prices across Canada at the time. In 2016, Toronto residents paid \$60 more per month than the average Canadian for electricity. And between 2010 and 2016, large industrial users in Toronto and Ottawa experienced cost spikes of 53% and 46%, respectively, while the average increase in electric costs for the rest of Canada was only 14%. Not encouraging stats, if you live in province targeted by

Reportedly, the Trudeau government plans to release a final version of the new CERs rules by the end of this year. Clearly, in light of the government's failure to meaningfully consult with electrical-generation sector and the provinces, the CERs should be put on hold to allow for longer and more sincere efforts to consult before these regulations go into effect and become too entrenched for reform by a future government. Otherwise, Canadians may pay a steep price for Trudeau's gamble.

TIME CAPSULE



Chinese Commies at 75



"No one can stop the wheel of history," said China's President Xi Jinping on the 75th anniversary of the day when the Chinese Communist Party (CCP) proclaimed the creation of the People's Republic of China. And the wheel is indeed still turningbut that may not be good news for the fourth-generation heirs of that revolution.

The 1950s was the time of peak Communism, when people still feared or hoped that it would spread across the whole world. That was never likely, however, and apart from Cuba and Vietnam it never spread any farther. The Soviet Union itself finally evaporated peacefully in 1991 at the age of 74, taking the rest of the European Communist regimes down with it

At that point China suddenly became the world's oldest surviving Communist state – which had the same psychological impact on the CCP as losing one's own parents does to those in the middle generation. Suddenly your own generation is on the front-line, with personal extinction waiting for you down the road.

The Chinese Communist revolution was still only forty-two years old in 1991, of course, but a chill wind began to blow as Party members realised that Communist regimes can be mortal too. From that time on, avoiding the fate of the Soviet Union has become the unwritten subtext of almost every major policy decision the CCP regime has made.

Inevitably, there were competing prescriptions for

the best way to avoid that fate. By the middle 1990s two dominant strategies had emerged, espoused by two rival factions: the 'princelings', who were the children and grandchildren of the founding revolutionary heroes, and the 'populists', who had risen by merit.

Most 'populists' had grown up poor somewhere in the country's vast interior and were aware of the needs of vulnerable social groups like farmers, migrant workers and the urban poor. Their formula for outlasting the Soviet Union was a more generous welfare state, more open media, and more democracy within the Party.

Most of them came up through the Communist Youth League and were known in Chinese as tuanpai ('the League faction').

The 'princelings', by contrast, were born to privilege and rose easily upward through the ranks of the ruling party as they matured. They generally took a more authoritarian and centralising approach to politics, and they regularly pointed out that it was Mikhail Gorbachev's attempt to 'reform' the Soviet Communist Party that precipitated its downfall.

However, in the nineties and the noughties the Chinese economy was still growing very fast, and a choice between the rival strategies could easily be postponed. For almost three decades the two factions carefully shared power and never attacked each other in public. But then the economic miracle ran out of steam.

There was really nothing miraculous about China's thirty years of high-speed growth (10% a year). Most industrialising economies get that one-time bonus growth while the rural population migrates to the cities and provides emerging industries with almost limitless cheap labour.

Britain had that in 1850-1880, the United States in 1870-1900, Russia in 1920-1940 (cut short by the Second World War), and Japan in 1950-1980. It never lasts, and China's time was up by 2015.

Since then Beijing has been cooking the books to maintain the pretense of at least a 5% growth rate, but the real growth rate is 2%-3% at best – and probably negative growth during the lockdown years. The glory days are past, and the question of how to avoid the Soviet Union's fate must be faced squarely.

That's why the truce between the princelings and the populists was broken in 2012-2015, as Xi Jinping, the ultimate princeling, took over all the major offices of state: President of the Chinese People's Republic, General Secretary of the Chinese Communist Party, and Chairman of the Central Military Commission. It is decided: the future is authoritarian.

There's no surprise in that. The princelings were always a more cohesive faction, and 'reform' is seen as by most Chinese Communists as the gateway to oblivion. The question is whether repression can be a successful long-term strategy, especially when the economy is no longer growing fast and the population is going into decline.

We can't really estimate the likely longevity of the kind of high-tech total surveillance state that Xi Jinping is building in China now, because it's a new thing in history. It's more ambitious than any previous experiment in controlling human behaviour, and if it works then the regime could turn out to be immortal.

On the other hand, you just have to write that sentence down to realise how implausible it is. The Old Hundred Names have seen off a dozen other dynasties and countless invaders; they're probably not finished yet.



I was in Canmore last year and walked past a store with a very plain sign in the window, not eye-catching at all, black print on white, but it shouted to me because of what it said and how much I needed to hear the message, "When you get tired learn to rest not to quit". I walked past only to turn around and purchase the sign. Each time I enter my office I am greeted by these words which I am sure God knew I would need daily.

In our kitchen I have another simple black



"Both occupants of the sedan, both 22-year-old residents of Rolling Hills, were pronounced deceased at the scene," he said.

There were no injuries to the driver of the pick-up truck.

David, who started with
the department on Nov.
23, 2023, as someone
who was enthusiastic and

continuously learning so he could move up the ranks.

In August 2024

David joined three other volunteers from the city and county to help fight forest fires in northern Alberta.

Dickinson recalls David first approaching him about the department.

"He said he had been walking by the department all the time and was thinking about joining. He saw my truck at one day while I was doing paperwork and he came in and introduced himself and said he would like to join.

"It was quite a joy to have somebody young and new step forward to join up," said Dickinson

"It's a very tragic loss for their family and for us."

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

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
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US Elections always a concern for Canadian trade... agriculture will be affected despite the outcome



Presidential elections have caused outbreaks trade anxiety many in industry Canadian sectors agriculture being one of them. One anxiety is that no matter which candidate wins, neither will be towards favourable Canadian export trade interests. Sure, their trade attitude is based on US politics and the business of getting elected, and it may be directed more toward China than Canada. Still, as the previous Trump administration has shown, Canada gets caught in the crossfire. When that happens, the Canadian government panics and launches an intense lobbying campaign to cut Canada out of any US trade war. A recent example was when the Trump administration imposed

high tariffs on aluminum

and steel imports. That tariff seemed unfair to considering Canada. how integrated those metal-related industries are between our two countries. However, Canada wasn't innocent bystander cheap Chinese aluminum and steel imports into undermined the US/Canada metal business. The subsequent Canadian exemption from the US tariff happened after Canada imposed similar tariffs on Chinese imports. One wonders if it wouldn't be easier if Canada and coordinated US their tariff imposition so we don't repeat these incidents. Shouldn't such tariff coordination be harmonized under the CUSMA (Canada/ US/Mexico (free trade) Agreement)? European Union (EU) operates that way to its advantage, giving them a big stick when negotiating free trade agreements. The US Biden

administration

seen as an ideological kindred spirit by the present federal Liberal government. However. perhaps to their chagrin, the Biden administration has shown religious zeal towards protectionism with their buy US-made policy, which primarily industries affects Canada, central government's Liberal political heartland. That approach is sure to be intensified if Democrat candidate Kamala Harris, who is supported by the majority of protectionist American unions, is elected. I expect Canadian agriculture î producer groups to be on high alert, contemplating the possible consequences of the US election on their sectors. The Canadian Cattle Association (CCA) has a long history of dealing with US trade and border mischief. particularly the Country Origin Labelling (COOL) issue. I expect that issue will be instigated into resurrection by anti-Canadian trade lobby groups like the notorious

R-CALF. The latter is a politically shrewd group - associating itself with progressive consumer groups to get the attention of Democratic administrations and using its rural Trumpfriendly base appeal to Republican administrations. The CCA does have support of the National Cattlemens Beef Association (NCBA) when it comes to trade policy. They are quite aware that restricting cattle and beef imports into the US could have a retaliatory impact on US beef exports. But let's face it - regardless of which US administration is in power, the political and patriotic lure of boosting Americangrown/made food is irresistible to American politicians.

issue for The big Canada will be the renewal of the CUSMA free trade agreement in 2026. The best outcome for Canadian agriculture will be no unwelcome changes to the treaty for the industry. But alas, that

may be wishful thinking; US trade negotiators will want to discuss Canadian supply management and dairy/poultry import quotas and tariffs. The approach to that issue will depend on which party is the government in both Canada and the US. However, the producers' lobby machine stands war ready if any Canadian government waivers.

Harris is elected If her administration

is bound to become more progressive and strident about saving the planet. She will probably insist severe environmental standards, restrictions, goals, etc., being inserted into a new CUSMA trade treaty. One expects carbon taxes on cattle, herbicide restrictions. nitrogen reductions and worse to be topics of discussion. In that progressive green approach, the Harris administration will have the support of the new progressive leftist President, Claudia Sheinbaum of Mexico. the other partner in CUSMA. She is a past Mexican secretary of the environment. Add green-obsessed Trudeau, and we could see North America being ruled by a progressiveleft-green troika. Now there is a terrifying thought for Canadian and North American agriculture. Interesting times are surely coming.



2024 saw fewer grass fires, more collisions

BROOKS BULLETIN

The number of grass fires that the Brooks Fire Department responded to between Jan. 1 and Oct. 5 of this year decreased while the number of motor vehicle collisions increased 85 per cent over last year.

2023 the department responded to 64 grass fire calls while in 2024 to date they have responded to 22 which is an decrease of 66 per cent.

At the same time motor vehicle collisions were up 85 per cent to 72 this year versus 39 last year.

Overall to date, the department's calls service were 395 which is an overall increase of nine per cent.

include The property fires which increased from 10 last year to 16 this year.

EMS assists were up 62.5 per cent over last year. The department helped EMS 26 so far this year and 16 last year. Of those 21 were within Brooks and five were within the city's rural response area including

Division 5 and 10 in the county. For the first time in a few years, there were zero calls for water rescues or livestock rescues. Last year there five water calls and three livestock calls.

In total, 306 or 77 per cent of all calls were in the city and 23 per cent or 89 calls were within the rural response area.

Regional The Training ground was used 21 days to date this year and more dates are scheduled compared to 16 days last





2024 Fire Prevention Week message from area fire chiefs

Oct. 6 marks the beginning of the 102nd Fire Prevention This year's Week. is Smoke theme alarms: Make them work for you...

Everyone is reminded of the importance of having working smoke alarms in their homes as we emphasize this campaign's key call to action: "INSTALL, TEST and REPLACE smoke alarms".

Test smoke alarms at least once a month by pushing the test button.

Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10-years-old or stop responding when tested.

Today's homes burn faster than ever.

You may have as little as two minutes (or even less time) to safely escape a home fire from the time the smoke alarm sounds.

Your ability to get out of a home during a fire depends on early warning from smoke alarms and advance planning.

Home fire escape planning and practicing

It is important for everyone to plan and practice a home fire escape.

Everyone needs to be prepared in advance so that they know what to do when the smoke alarm sounds. Given that every home is

different, every home fire escape plan will also be different.

Have a plan for everyone in the home and remember that children, older adults and people with disabilities may need assistance to wake up and get out.

Make sure that someone will help them!

Smoke alarms

Smoke alarms sense smoke well before you can, alerting you to danger.

Smoke alarms need to be in every bedroom, outside of the sleeping areas (like a hallway), and on each level (including the basement) of your home.

Do not put smoke alarms in your kitchen or bathrooms.

Choose an alarm that is listed with a testing laboratory, meaning it has met certain standards for protection.

For the best protection, use combination smoke and carbon monoxide alarms that are interconnected throughout the home.

These can be installed by a qualified electrician, so that when one sounds, they all sound. This ensures you can hear the alarm no matter where in your home the alarm originates.

Importance of fire prevention

In a fire, mere seconds

can mean the difference between a safe escape and a tragedy.

Fire safety education isn't just for school children. Teenagers, adults and the elderly are also at risk in fires, making it important for every member of the community to take some time every October during Fire Prevention Week to make sure they understand how to stay safe in case of a

This Fire Prevention Week, we're focusing on one of the most crucial tools in fire safety: Smoke Detectors. A working smoke detector can mean the difference between life and death in the event of a fire. In fact, having functioning smoke detectors in your home cuts the risk of firerelated fatalities in half. You may only have under two minutes to get to safety once the smoke detector goes off.

Here's what you need to know to keep your family safe:

• Install Smoke Detectors on Every Level: Place smoke detectors in every bedroom, outside sleeping areas, and on every level of your home, including the basement.

- Test Your Alarms Monthly: Press the test button to ensure the alarm is working. It only takes a few seconds but can save precious time in a real emergency.
- Replace the Batteries Once a Year: Even if your alarms haven't beeped for a low battery warning, change the batteries anyways so they stay reliable.
- Replace Detectors Every 10 Years: Did you know, smoke detectors lose sensitivity over time? Check the manufacturing date on your alarm and replace it if it's over 10 years old.
- Use Interconnected Alarms: For better protection, consider

installing interconnected smoke alarms so that when one alarm sounds, they all

By staying vigilant and maintaining your smoke detectors, you're protecting not only your home but your loved ones as well. This small action can provide critical early warning during a fire, giving you the precious time needed to escape safely.

The Brooks fire department has purchased a regional fire safety simulator as a tool to teach fire prevention.



The unit is wheelchair accessible, solar powered and fully interactive.



Service dogs are used for a wide variety of services from anxiety to retrieving, alerting a person with hearing loss, guiding the blind, preventing an autistic child from wandering and helping with diabetes management or detecting alerts or impending seizures. Costs to train a service dog can climb up to \$20,000 so many organizations depend on donations. | SANDRA M



Tips for motorists and pedestrians in the shorter days

The shorter days can heavily impact visibility and driving conditions so this month RCMP are focusing on pedestrian and driver safety.

RCMP Bassano providing tips for drivers and pedestrians to ensure the safety of all road users.

Drivers should drive the speed limit to ensure you can brake if required and to be mindful in slower

zones such as school and playground areas especially in the early morning or late afternoon.

Never pass vehicles that are stopped at a crosswalk and neither motorists or pedestrians should assume

they can be seen. Both pedestrians and motorists should make eye contact before turning at an intersection or before stepping off the road at a crosswalk.

Motorists should always

yield to pedestrians.-

Pedestrians should also follow the rules of the road, try to cross at marked crosswalks but if one is not available, cross the road at a well lit intersection.

Make sure that you are visible, including wearing high visibility or reflective clothing so you can be seen and always make sure vehicles in all directions have stopped before you enter a crosswalk.
