Royal Helium has filed for protection under the Bankruptcy and Insolvency Act (BIA) to allow it time to restructure its debts and negotiate with its creditors.

During restructuring Neigum, the Shayne company's vp of geology and the acting COO resigned to pursue other interests.

The company officially opened the world's first helium purification plant in Steveville in 2023 to a lot pomp and circumstance that included Alberta premier Danielle Smith.

The company expecting to produce 15 million cubic feet of raw gas from wells.

They stated they had three-year purchase commitment to major North American aerospace and launch industries at

an average price of \$538 per thousand cubic feet of helium.

Since its opening the company stock has fluctuated in trade from about 46-cents to two-cents.



Late Fees Waived for Specific Utility Accounts

The City of Brooks is waiving late fees for certain utility accounts due to delays caused by the Canada Post strike. This decision was made to address concerns from residents who did not receive their utility bills on time. Below is what residents need to know:

Which Bills Are Impacted?

Only utility bills that begin with 002, issued on November 15, 2024, and received penalties on December 17/18, 2024, will have their late fees waived.

How Will This Be Processed?

City staff will manually reverse the charges associated with these penalties. This process is expected to take 1-2 billing cycles to complete for all affected accounts.

How Will Adjustments Be Made?

A credit will be applied directly to eligible accounts. Please note that no refunds will be issued.

Bassano derailment due to track deterioration

Transportation The Safety Board of Canada has determined that the cause of the July 2022 derailment in Bassano was deterioration of the track.

"The track buckled under the passage of CP train 301-222 leading to the derailment of 41 cars (of 203 cars) at Mile 97.4 of the Brooks Subdivision Alberta," near Bassano, Transportation Canada reported in its investigation that was released last week.

The investigation found that the track showed signs of degradation that was consistent with many years

Video from the 44 mph (71 km) train did not show any indication of a defect in the track when the locomotive passed over Mile 97.4, however, the mid-train locomotives passed over the same location, "There was noticeable side-toside sway in the recorded video indicating that a misalignment developed progressively under the train."

"Signs of deterioration had also been evident in track inspection records for more than a year," states the report. It noted that there had been frequent urgent narrow-gauge conditions which may be indicative of insufficient track securement and elevated compressive forces."



Jagmeet Singh and NDP out of touch on Donald Trump deportees

Want 25% tariffs imposed on everything entering the States from Canada as soon as possible? Well then, Mr. Singh, please continue trying to make Canada's border even more of an immigration concern for the Americans.

New Democrat Leader Jagmeet Singh wants Canada to renege on a treaty it has with the United States that says people illegally in one of the two countries cannot apply for refugee status in the other.

For nearly six years, from 2017 to 2023, the Liberal government itself ignored the 2004 Safe Third Country Agreement (STCA). Tens of thousands of so-called "Irregular" border crossers from the United States were welcomed to Canada, the vast majority of them through the infamous Roxham Road crossing between Upstate New York and Quebec.

Now Jagmeet Singh wants to open the floodgates again, this time to welcome illegal aliens in the U.S. who are trying to avoid deportation as part of the immigration crackdown ordered by newly installed President Donald Trump.

As of Friday, American immigration officials had deported or detained over 1,500 people who were in the U.S. illegally. The vast majority of those rounded up had criminal records. And the vast majority of those had histories of violent crime.

Yet Singh wants Canada to abrogate the STCA and make itself a haven for more illegal immigrants.

When Singh said this week that it was "sad" and "scary" what was going on in the States, I'm confident he wasn't making a case specifically to turn Canada into a refuge for murderers, rapists, bank robbers and wifebeaters.

However, our border protections are already so weak that they are at the core of Trump's tariff threats against Canadian industries. If we were to follow Singh's recommendation and open our borders to American deportees, there can be little doubt that criminals would embed themselves among the other deportees.

"I think it's really sad for the folks in the States right now," Singh lamented. "It's really scary for a lot of folks. I just want to acknowledge how scary that must be for people who ... now feel really alone, who feel really afraid."

"I think what Canada has always done is shown as a

country that we are there for people when they are in a time of need. It's something that has been a point of pride for Canada."

Yep, sappy sentimentality, that's the emotion we want driving our immigration policy. Not only do we have a problem of our own with millions too many immigrants, but the future prosperity of our economy is dependent on how we handle our borders with the Americans.

Want 25% tariffs imposed on everything entering the States from Canada as soon as possible? Want the economic repercussions that would go along with the Americans imposing such punitive measures? Well then, Mr. Singh, please continue trying to make Canada's border even more of an immigration concern for the Americans.

Another consideration is that we already have a problem of our own with super-high immigration.

The Americans estimate they have 11 million illegal immigrants on their shores. Canada has nearly five million foreign students, visitors, tourists and temporary workers whose visas will expire this year, and no way for our government to force those with expired visas to leave.

And remember, we have a population only one-ninth the size of theirs.

If you want to know why the NDP has failed to make headway politically, even as the Liberals have stumbled, here's a prime example of how completely out-of-touch they have become with where ordinary Canadians are mentally.

It's true the Liberals have back immigration scaled somewhat, but nowhere near enough. From July through the Trudeau September, government admitted "only" 177,000 people, which, according to Statistics Canada was "the slowest quarterly growth since the first quarter of 2022."

That still means nearly threequarters of a million immigrants will enter Canada this year. We have capacity in our housing market, our labour force and health care system for about 300,000.

Now on top of that number, Singh wants to add tens of thousands more illegals from the States.

The Slide Back Towards War: Kagame & Trump



We seem to be drifting back into the world of 'Might Makes Right'. That would be a bad place to be.

Last June the president of Rwanda, Paul Kagame, said that he was ready to go to war with the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRCongo) if necessary. He still hasn't formally declared war, but 3,000-4,000 Rwandan troops are already across the DRCongo border and many more are just behind them.

When Donald Trump first broached the notion of acquiring Greenland in 2019, he called it "essentially a large real estate deal." Now he says that he won't rule out using military force to gain control of the vast territory, which is part of Denmark but free to leave if its people (mostly indigenous Inuit) wish to.

I know, you're saying to yourself that this is a ridiculous comparison. The two potential victims are completely different: the DRCongo is a poor tropical country with more than 100 million people, while Greenland is a prosperous Arctic country with only 52,000 citizens and Denmark is a member of NATO and the European Union.

There's an equally huge disparity between the two potential aggressors. Rwanda is a heavily armed and militaristic country of 14 million people, sort of a big Sparta, while the United States is...well, it's a heavily armed and rather militaristic country of 341 million people. So kind of a gigantic Sparta, but with a

more relaxed moral tone.

Nevertheless, it is fair to judge them by the same rules, for they are all sovereign states and have all signed the UN Charter. Article Two states clearly: "All Members shall settle their international disputes by peaceful means in such a manner that international peace and security, and justice, are not endangered."

That means they have promised not to settle their disputes by war – and the African pair, Rwanda and the DRC, also signed the Charter of the African Union, which requires the member states to respect the borders "existing on achievement of independence."

In other words, they agreed never to change or challenge the old colonial borders, however irrational they may seem in ethnic or historical terms. Otherwise African countries would face generations of interstate wars as various countries tried to achieve more 'convenient' borders.

And amazingly, it worked, more or less. These rules have for the most part been obeyed for more than two generations. There have been many internal wars but few cross-border wars, and even those rarely result in border changes. Moreover, in the few cases where borders are changed by force, other countries do not recognise the changes as legitimate.

This remarkable turn towards peace and justice, which has seen deaths in the world's wars fall from a million a month in 1942-1945 to tens of thousands a year by 2020, was driven mostly by the fear of nuclear war.

The great powers did not dare fight each other directly because they would be de-stroyed by nuclear weapons. They also tried to damp down other, lesser wars because they worried about escalation, and most other countries were glad to have

an excuse to stop. The period between 1950 and 2020 was probably the most peaceful in the history of civilization.

The new rules made sense in the circumstances, so people behaved accordingly. Indeed, after the Cold War I could go into the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Moscow and get approximately the same lecture about the need to obey the rules that I would receive in the State Department in Washington.

The worry is that the generations turn over and gradually the old lessons are forgot-ten. Vladimir Putin probably knew the rules once, but he doesn't think they matter any more. Donald Trump has probably never heard of them. They both think you can just grab some territory and get away with it, like you could in the 1600s or the 1800s.

They are wrong. Actions have consequences, and in the current era everything connects. Putin thought he could conquer Ukraine in a week, and next month will mark three years of war. Trump really could seize Greenland in a week, but the blowback from every-where else would be hugely damaging and long-lasting.

As for Paul Kagame, he really should know better. This is the third time in the past thirty years that he has sent his troops (or Tutsi militants like the current M23 militia) into DRCongo to seize the north-east region's rich mineral resources. Twice the African Union has come up with enough forces to push him out, and it might yet manage it again.

So it's not over yet. The erosion of the post-1945 international rules is real and alarming, but so far enough people still remember why we made them in the first place.


Together



Meat industry establishes China Access Mission... perils to challenge include politics, tariffs, retaliation

A coalition of meat industry groups announced recently that they would be opening a Canadian Meat Advocacy office Beijing, China. groups include the Canadian Cattle Association, Canadian Council, and Pork Canadian Meat Council. Canada Agriculture is providing a project development grant of \$223,000. The intent of the new advocacy office, according to their media pronouncement, is - to include advancing interests the Canadian red meat in China, establishing and enhancing the presence of Canadian meat in the Chinese market, addressing market access issues, mitigating potential trade disruption, and building trust with Chinese officials, industry leaders.

It goes on to extrapolate - that this initiative, is a first of its kind, aims to strengthen connections with the Chinese red meat sector, government agencies, and consumers alike, fostering an enduring relationship between the two countries. That would be a great leap forward if it could decrease the Chinese government's arbitrary trade restrictions like what occurred with the Chinese Princess incarceration case. That retaliatory incident cost Canadian ag exports billions in lost sales to China.

The pronouncement states the new advocacy office is the first of its kind. That might cause one to presume that other Canadian government, industry agency, trade office, or embassy has done any of the proposed advocacy activities. Perhaps some or all of those aforementioned entities did carry out some of

the advocacy activities that the new office will carry out, but not to the satisfaction of Canadian meat producers and industry groups. One presumes research was done by the proponents of the new advocacy office that justified its need and establishment. That causes some further wondering as to what all the existing Canadian and provincial trade offices are doing in China.

A cursory review of government websites shows that the Canadian government, through various entities, operates 10 trade advocacy offices throughout China. I suspect the folks at those trade offices are already doing some of the activities proposed for the new meat advocacy office. Depending on the year, meat exports to China represent about 25% of the total exports of \$22 billion. It would be fair to presume that Canadian trade officers in China are devoting at least 25% of their

time to advocating for more Canadian meat exports. Presumably, there are also political and intergovernmental officers in the Canadian embassy in Beijing who deal with the more sensitive government-to-government meat trade issues.

Besides Canadian trade officers, there is a Canadian Agriculture and Food Trade Service Commission that maintains 18 trade officers in 15 global markets, with China being one of those markets. Presumably, those folks are also fervently looking after some meat advocacy in China, at least for part of their time. I note that the renowned Canada Beef Inc. has had an office in China for some time. However, I am told they are not in the advocacy business but more in actual beef merchandising promotion for Canadian exporters and Chinese buyers. There is also Alberta-specific

trade officer in Beijing paid for by the Alberta government whose role, I expect, is to promote/ advocate for Albertaspecific exports like meat. Other provinces also have such provincespecific trade officers in Beijing. One might expect that all those Canadian/Provincial/ Industry trade and advocacy officers in China must be bumping into each other trying to drum markets for the same Canadian meat exports. It should be no surprise if one of those trade officers becomes the new CEO of the newfangled Canadian Meat Advocacy Office. But I

digress.

To be fair, we should give the benefit of the doubt to the new meat advocacy office. Surely, it is intended to fill some gap in meat advocacy that a platoon of existing China trade officers cannot do for the Canadian meat industry in China – time will tell. Interestingly, the Canadian government

has a report entitled "Evaluation Canadian Trade Offices in China." It notes the hard work of the offices and their contribution to trade but states it's difficult to quantify their success due to the myriad difficulties of operating in China. Not unexpectantly from an entrenched entitled federal bureaucracy, they could not admit any real mistakes but instead recommended besides administrative efficiencies, money and support be directed towards the offices in China.

Finally, with all these trade/advocacy/ promotion officers in China, one suspects that redundancy does happen. Perhaps they could all get together and carve out specific responsibilities, or is that too much common sense?





Brooks Housing Society's plan for additional units continues

SANDRA M STANWAY BROOKS BULLETIN

County council has given their support to the Brooks Housing Society as they seek a grant to add affordable housing units in the Meadowlake area.

The society is applying to the Alberta Affordable Housing Partnership Program and CMHC Affordable Housing Fund to secure financing to move forward with construction.

The society would like to build 20-24 three-to-four bedroom units, however, final designs are still being made.

Housing **Brooks** manages Prairie Village's 87 low income rental units which are made up of one, two and three bedrooms.

The affordable housing strategy that was completed for the city in 2019 found that roughly 390 households were overcrowded. That represented a 29.7 per cent increase in overcrowded households since 2011.

Last spring society was approved for a matching grant of \$153,900 in seed money from the Federation of Canadian Municipalities Green Municipal Fund. The funds are being used to undertake a project design for preliminary work on

the expansion. At that time housing chair Reg Radke said in order to be considered for

FCM funds the society had to look at options in terms of energy, efficiency and any conservation efforts.

In May 2022 the city sold the property at 531 Meadowbrook Drive East to the society for \$1 for the construction of the new units. The development was to have started within two years or the property was to have been returned to the city.

The society did receive an extension.

phase of The first the Meadow Lake Way development began in 2004 and all units were filled that fall. An additional unit was constructed and in 2019 the mortgages were paid on the buildings.



Don was the fourth of six children. In 1960 Don and Edith moved to the University of Illinois for his master's degree, then on to Stanford for his PhD. In 1967 Don returned to Canada to take up a faculty position in the Department of Civil Engineering at UBC. In the latter part of his career, he specialized in the design of earthquake-resistant structures; he joined delegations invited to tour the aftermath of major earthquakes in California, Japan and Turkey. As a professor he made full use of his sabbatical privileges, working and conducting research in the Niagara region, New Zealand, San Diego, and Japan. Don retired in 1999 but remained a regular presence in the department; he kept himself busy with conference organization and consulting work for many years afterward.

Until this past year, Don and Edith lived in their house near the university, where they remained devoted to their garden. Both before and in retirement Don and Edith travelled widely and enjoyed skiing, cycling, hiking and otherwise exploring the outdoors. A keen hockey player, Don didn't hang up the skates until he reached the ripe old age of 79.

Family and friends were and still are a huge part of Don and Edith's life together. Far too many to list, but you know who you are. The collegiality of the civil engineering department was beyond admirable; his colleagues remained his lifelong friends. Don retained a strong connection to Alberta, to both his extended family and the landscape itself; after decades enjoying the beauties of the coast, he would still sigh happily at the sight of endless prairie.

Don is survived by his wife Edith, his daughter Lis and her husband Owen, his son Scott and his wife Annette and their daughter Madeleine, and his sister Beth. He is predeceased by his brothers Dick, Bud and Lincoln, and his sister Joyce.
