One person arrested after high school lockdown

Tilley youth arrested...

Brooks Composite High School was placed into a lockdown at about 8:26 a.m. on Monday following a threat.

Other Grasslands schools, including the junior high and Tilley School which is about 25 km east of Brooks, were placed in a hold and secure.

"Grasslands Public Schools was made aware of a social media threat involving Brooks Composite High School," stated Rayne Makin, communications manager for Grasslands.

"As a precaution, RCMP were contacted immediately and the school was placed into lockdown which was later downgraded to a hold and secure."

RCMP media reported that the investigation has revealed that there was no direct threat to the school, however, it did involve students from the school.

"RCMP has arrested a male youth in relation to this threat. He was arrested at his residence in Tilley."

Many of the high school students were temporarily placed at the junior high until the situation was resolved just before 9 a.m.

Although Makin said there was no individual with a weapon on any school premises, a video obtained by The Bulletin shows police entering BCHS with long guns and rifles in hand.

"RCMP continue to investigate and we want to clarify that there was no individual with a weapon at any school. Any social media reports suggesting otherwise are not accurate," Makin stated.

"Student and staff safety is always our top priority. All schools followed our established safety protocol and we are grateful for the support of our staff, families, and local law enforcement," Makin said.

Police are continuing to investigate.

Overall decrease in county taxes

The county will collect \$33,778,999 in municipal taxes and will collect just over \$48 million in total including \$14,229,572 for the province in school taxes and \$946,010 for the Newell Housing Foundation.

Assessments in the county increased by \$382 million from last year to

\$4.6 billion.

"The 2025 tax rates have been adjusted to capture some of that growth which provided an additional \$817,000 in municipal tax revenue compared to last year's budget," Shannon Biette, the county's corporate services supervisor, told council last week.

Over the last five years the tax rates across the county have generally decreased

except for farmland which has increased by 17.7 per cent to help cover a larger share of the agricultural services budget.

In 2021 the residential rate was 4.2276 mills and the 2025 proposed rate is 3.64 mills, the small business rate in 2021 was 6.8983 and is proposed to be 6.1875, farmland rate was 7.5248 in 2021 and will be 8.8552 which is unchanged from last year.

The non-residential tax rate was 8.9981 in 2021 and is proposed to be 8.25 this year.

"That represents a decrease in (the non-res) tax rate of 8.3 per cent," said CAO Matt Fenske which was largely expected at the end of the provincial oil and gas assessment holiday.

"I think it's a good news story for our ratepayers."

The county gave first reading to the tax rate

bylaw. The final readings are expected to take place at the next council meeting.

In addition, the municipal portion of taxes that are paid by June 16, 2025 will be subject to a 2.5 per cent discount.

Darren Adamson of Avail, who presented the 2024 audited financial statements, said the county continues to be in good financial shape with little debt and strong controls.

He said if there is a change in capital or operating grants from the province, the county would be able to weather some of the changes.

Referring to the letter of recommendation, Adamson said, "The county has a very strong system of processes and controls, so we don't have any recommendations."



NOTICE OF PESTICIDE CONTROL & MOWING ACTIVITIES

Public Notice is hereby given that the Agricultural Service Board of the County of Newell intends to conduct pesticide control and mowing activities during the 2025 growing season.

The County's Roadside Vegetation Control Program is aimed at meeting five objectives:

- 1. Allow clear sight lines to signs and intersections
- 2. Reduce snow accumulation
- 3. Promote road drainage and drying
- 4. Facilitate snow removal
- 5. Control weeds (prevent spread)

The program outlined below deals with vegetation control through the application of recommended vegetation control chemicals. The County also uses protective cultural practices to control weeds, where practical, which includes mowing.

PESTICIDE PROGRAM

Deals with controlling weeds on County rights-of-way, Countyowned land, work within the Town of Bassano, City of Brooks, Village of Duchess, and Grasslands School Division property.

The herbicides to be used include: 2 4-D Ester LV7OO, 2 4-D Amine 6OO, Oracle, RT 54O, Lontrel 36O, Garlon XRT, Estaprop XT, Milestone, Aspect, Clearview, Esplanade, Overdrive, Navius Flex, OcTTain XL and Trillion P.



Spray efforts will be focused South of Highway #1, but spot spraying on an as needed basis will be done in the entire County. In addition, spraying may be completed for noxious and prohibited noxious weeds along the Bow River.

Projected timeline of pesticide application ——— May 5 - October 15



Any residents who DO NOT wish to have areas sprayed adjacent to their land must fill out a NO-SPRAY Application Form and post signs BY MAY 15, 2025.

These are available at the County of Newell office.

All pesticides and procedures used comply with Federally approved label recommendations and regulations set out by Alberta Agriculture and Irrigation and Alberta Environment.

ROADSIDE MOWING PROGRAM

Begins June 10th and will include all developed County rights-ofway. Anyone wishing to hay a portion of a right-of-way must fill out a Haying Permit by June 1, 2025.



Discussions begin to improve 'Lake Road'

County council endorsed a request that the province widen and pave Highway 873 south of the city to Kinbrook Island Provincial Park and that it should be a top priority of Alberta Transportation.

Also known locally as the Lake Road, Highway 873 is a two lane provincial highway with no shoulders that carries motorists to the provincial park.

In March a local resident asked premier/Brooks-Medicine Hat MLA Danielle Smith during her town hall meeting if the highway could be upgraded. It was discussed during the rural municipalities convention the minister of transportation and again in April while the minister was in Brooks.

Council's discussion and decision was to have been part of a meeting with the transportation minister that was set for April 15.

The county covered 50 per cent of the costs, about \$20 million, and acted as the project manager when they partnered with the province to pave and widen Highway 873 from Kinbrook Island to Highway 36 and to pave Highway 535 from Highway 873 to Tilley.

County to tender reserve land in Bow City

The county will consider issuing a tender for the sale of municipal reserve (MR) in Bow City.

A request was recently received by the county to sell a portion of the 5.77 acre portion of MR-designated land in Bow City to provide rental opportunities for visitors and for personal use.

However, council wanted it to go to tender for fair bidding by other interested parties.

"This isn't the first time that I have received this request," said Maria Jackson, the county's planning and development supervisor.

The county has received three inquires about selling the MR land in the hamlet but the most recent discussion that was a formal request.

City OK's downtown **b**usiness taxes

The city last week approved the Business Improvement Area bylaw which is to be paid by all members of the Brooks Revitalization Zone.

On behalf of the BRZ, the city collects an additional tax from downtown business owners and there is no direct financial implication

on the city.

This year the BRZ is expected to receive \$22,500 cover programs such as Communities in Bloom, Christmas in the Park, street fair and membership to the chamber of commerce.

Last year's request was for \$22,000 which included funds for Communities in Bloom, summer and winter events as well as office expenses and marketing.

Council Highlights - April 7, 2025

Here are the key highlights from the April 7 Council Meeting:

- RCMP Introduction Council welcomed the new RCMP Detachment Commander, Staff Sgt. Rob
- **STARS Presentation** STARS reported over 500 missions in the County of Newell since 2010, with 78% in Brooks.

City will purchase new impeller for wave pool

The city will purchase a new impeller for the wave pool at the recreation centre.

In his report to council, CAO Chris Parker noted that the fan impeller disintegrated and it has been difficult to obtain a quote for a replacement due to the specific dimensions for the part.

The city has paid for repairs over the past few years but according to Parker replacing the entire unit makes more sense.

Last week he told council the replacement unit is

about \$40,200 and although the manufacturing company is Canadian, there could be unexpected tariffs. It will take between 12 and 16 weeks for the part to arrive.

Administration will look at "operational efficiencies" in the rec area for the funding while some of it will come from reserve.



weak thunderstorms, ECCC reported.

ECCC received multiple reports and photos.

"This tornado has been given a preliminary rating of EF-0," states the ECCC in a weather report.

"Landspout tornadoes do not usually cause significant damage but can still be dangerous as they can topple trees, damage roofs, or toss debris a short distance."

Meteorologist Justin Shelley told The Bulletin the rating means that the wind speed was between 90km/ hour and 130 km/hour.

"The main way we measure wind speed is based on damage," he said.

However, there has been no damage reported. Meteorologists

seeking pictures of the tornado and/or damage it may have caused.





Voters' faith in Grits for resource development is staggeringly foolish

Of course, I've noticed the huge crowds Pierre Poilievre has been attracting to his rallies. They are the biggest campaign rallies for any Canadian politician in more than 50 years. Perhaps ironically, the only rallies as large or larger were those held by Pierre Trudeau's in the late 1960s and early

Liberal Leader Mark Carney leads in polls by as much as nine

The pollster I trust the most, Abacus Data, shows the Liberals and Conservatives tied at 39 per cent each. However, as Abacus CEO David Coletto, said last weekend, "because of the efficiency of the Liberal vote," a tie means at least a Liberal minority government. (The Liberal vote is spread more evenly across high-population regions.)

Do I trust the voting-preference polls? Not entirely. They tend to oversample older voters, who favour the Liberals, and undersample younger voters who prefer the Conservatives. But when nearly all major polls show similar results, you can ignore the specific numbers but not the trends.

I don't believe the polls are a conspiracy to hide the truth about Poilievre's support and manipulate public opinion towards the Liberals. The Libs are ahead, I'm just not sure by how much. And are they ahead enough to hold off the Conservatives' groundswell momentum?

Recall that most American polls showed Kamala Harris ahead of Donald Trump, yet Trump (and his rallies) won the day.

Having said all that, there is an issues poll (not votingpreference poll) that truly worries me. Indeed, it angers me and makes me despair for the future of Alberta within Canada.

At the beginning of the month, Ipsos asked voters which party they trusted most to develop Canada's energy sector, create jobs and grow the economy.

This is the Conservatives' issue. Has been for years. Along with affordability for ordinary families, growing the economy is the one-two punch for Pierre Poilievre and his party.

So who do Canadians favour to get our country out of the economic trench the Liberals dug us into over the past decade the lost Liberal decade?

According to Ipsos, more voters favour the Liberals. This is like trusting the doctor who botched your facelift to correct his own incompetent plastic surgery. Or putting a drunk driver behind the wheel of your Uber.

For nearly 10 years, the Liberals presided over the secondslowest economic growth among the world's 38 developed nations. While America's per capita GDP has grown nearly 23 per cent over the past 10 years (before Donald Trump's insane trade war), Canada's has barely budged — up just 1.4 per cent.

And the OECD estimates that if policies do not change, Canada will have the slowest growth among its member nations

So, pardon my language, who the hell is foolish enough to think leaving the Liberals in charge will change a damn thing?

It's the Liberals' environmental policy that scared away at least \$300 billion in investment — investment that could have made us stronger in the face of Trump's attacks. It's the Liberals' "green" obsession that cancelled pipelines that could already be operating to the East and West Coasts in defiance of Trump.

They were the ones who promised a middle-class tax cut during the 2015 campaign, then raised family taxes by \$6,000 or more during their time in office.

President Trump has managed to crash his country's economy in just a week. It took the Liberals over nine years longer. However, it amounts to pretty much the same thing.

Thankfully, in Ipsos' poll, Albertans and Saskatchewanians don't share the nation's love for the incompetent Liberals. But central and eastern voters' willingness to return the same ministers, MPs and staffers who caused such destruction is staggering (and infuriating).

Trump's tariffs have ricocheted around the world. Here's how it will change the system



In 10 whirlwind weeks, Donald Trump had already smashed the international system of rules and alliances that more or less kept the peace for the past 80 years, but his bizarre 'tariffs on everybody' policy has given us a glimpse of what may take its place.

It's the United States against the whole world, and America's only possible great-power ally is Russia.

Trump is expressing some irritation at the moment about Vladimir Putin's footdragging on a cease-fire in Ukraine, but his admiration for the Russian dictator and former KGB agent is deep and lasting. Besides, he has convinced America's former allies in Europe that he is not to be trusted, so he really has nowhere else to go.

Selling this switch of alliances to the American public will take a lot of work. However, if Franklin Roosevelt could persuade Americans that the Godless Communists of the old Soviet Union were suitable allies for America in the war against Hitler, Trump can sell Putin to his 'base' as a man who loves God and hates gays and 'woke' just as much as they do

This new de facto alliance will easily survive Trump's probable collaboration with İsrael in a massive joint strike against Iran in the next few months because Russia doesn't like the Islamist regime in Tehran either.

The real question i where does China go now? China's next steps

China has loyally refrained from criticizing Russia about its invasion of Ukraine because until now it, too, had nowhere else to go. But China is far less expansionist than Russia under Putin or the United States under Trump (Greenland, Panama, Canada, Gaza). It is basically a status quo power that wants to preserve the current international order.

The one exception that has allowed Beijing's enemies to portray it as expansionist is its insistent claim on Taiwan, but this dispute is just a loose end from a long-ago Chinese civil war. So long as China does not actually invade Taiwan, it is a suitable partner for the European Union in a new alliance dedicated to preserving the rule of law in the world.

It wouldn't be a marriage made in heaven, and it would never be as formal an alliance as the old NATO arrangement, but a joint undertaking by China and the European Union to protect the peace of the world from the rogue states of America and Russia makes perfectly good sense and may well come to pass.

Trump overestimates US role This is all the more likely because China and the EU have a shared interest in rescuing the low- or no-tariff free trading system of the past 80 years from the attack launched last week by Donald Trump. They would constitute a nucleus around which Japan, Korea, Australia, India, Canada and most other countries could rebuild that system without

Trump has greatly overestimated the ability of the United States to prevent a realignment of global trade that simply goes around it.

The US still accounts for 25 per cent of the world economy. the same share it had in 1980

 proof, if any were required, that it has not been taken "ripped off, raped, pillaged and plundered" by its trading partners.

But being largely self-sufficient, the United States only accounts for 13 per cent of world trade — so Trump cannot blackmail everybody else into doing his will.

Some individual enterprises and even a few entire countries will suffer greatly from his tariffs, but for the most part, the supply chains will just be adjusted to avoid running through the United States. The US share of global trade will drop further, and everybody else will get on with their lives.

No longer a world leader All unwitting, Trump is abdicating the leading role that the United States has enjoyed in world affairs since the Second World War and getting nothing of any value in return. Nobody saw this change coming and it's too early to be sure of where it will take us, but it may be a better place than the recent

What could still go wrong? The major European powers may prove unable to sustain Ukraine if the US military withdraws and a Russian conquest of Ukraine would lead to the remilitarisation of all Europe, probably including nuclear proliferation.

American invasions and Greenland. Panama perhaps even Canada would have a similar effect but on an even bigger scale.

A Chinese invasion of Taiwan would have the same impact in Asia, and it's still not clear if Beijing will take its distance from Moscow now that it has better options.

But on the whole, things are looking up. Apart from the growing climate catastrophe, of course.

We are nearing Good Friday and Easter again, and the question how and why Jesus' death on the cross would provide atonement, grace, and forgiveness for the sins of all mankind still looms large. Some struggle with the element of violence and bloodshed, others question the possibility of a substitutionary sacrifice on another person's behalf altogether. better understand what is going on here, we need to immerse ourselves in the object lessons God provides in the Old Testament and which are then used by Jesus and the apostles to fill

the terms with meaning and help us grasp their significance. This includes such things as the Passover - and the blood of the Passover Lamb in particular (John 1:29, 1 Corinthians 5:7; 1 Peter 1:18-19), the image of a ransom paid (Psalm 49:7-8, Mark 10:45; 1 Timothy 2:5-6), the scapegoat and the blood of the sacrificial animals sprinkled on the mercy seat in the Holy of Holies (Leviticus 16:10,14-22; Romans 3:25; Hebrews 9:11-14), the laying on of hands on the sin offering in Leviticus 1:3-4 as an act of substitution, the curse on a criminal hanged on a tree (Deuteronomy 21:22-23; Galatians 3:13), the innocent suffering servant bearing the punishment of our iniquities (Isaiah 53:3-11; Philippians 2:7-8), and Abraham offering up his one and only son (Genesis 22:2; John

3:16; Hebrews 11:17). 

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



The city's municipal tax rate decreased, however, the June tax bill will look significantly higher thanks to the collection of increased school taxes for the province and Newell Housing.

The city forecasted a municipal tax increase of 5.75 per cent which dropped to 5.59 per cent due to the 7.6 per cent increase in assessment. The city's assessment increased to \$1.957 billion over last year's amount of \$1.821

The municipal property bill will increase by \$142 to about \$2,684.

School taxes, collected for the province by the city, increased nine per cent over last year to \$4,529,436 and the housing requisition is \$333,450 which is an \$181,990 increase over last year.

Councillor Goodnough questioned the Foundation's increase.

"Do we have to say, 'Yeah. You can have it?" he asked.

"Theoretically no," said mayor John Petrie.

"But it is a small amount and it looks after mostly our seniors housing in Brooks."

Bill McKennan, city's director of finance, told council they must be collected, however, the amounts can be discussed with the organization.

Council passed repaving tax bylaw which is unchanged from last vear and in January the surface irrigation rates were increased by two per cent across the board. Lots under .32 acres are now paying \$161.85 and lots over .32 acres are paying \$323.70,

non-residential is \$505.79 per acre, the city's parks, cemetery and green spaces are \$505.79 per acre.

The city also increased

its utility rates in January. Residents have a base rate of \$66.32 which is up from last year's base rate of \$60.29.

Tax notices are typically

mailed in mid-June. The city's 2024 audited financial statement has not

yet been presented.



Organic wool - is it for real... expensive to grow and hard on sheep health

chance viewing of a TV ad promoting organic wool got your humble writer's attention. In past lives as a sheep rancher, and a wool buyer/judge, I have seen a lot of wool in various stages of quality. In all those roles, I presumed wool was unquestionably organic compared to synthetic fibres. But upon further enlightenment, I now understand that wool is considered to be just allnatural and not organic. I suspect most consumers were also unaware that there were two types of wool.

Thank goodness, kind-hearted marketers have saved us from ignorant being SO about wool. We are told by sanctimonious promoters that regular wool is produced by sheep that are exposed

by malicious owners to all kinds of nefarious chemicals that could contaminate the wool at every stage of its growth and processing. Wow, and here I thought vaccines, antibiotics, and parasiticides were there to maintain healthy sheep, which produce more and better wool. Apparently, organic sheep may only be treated with the organic version of those health aids. Just like in the good old days, when sheep were thrown into vats of toxic but organic tobaccosourced nicotine, which poisoned sheep lice and keds - sometimes the sheep too. Interestingly, a modern-day parasiticide, Ivermectin, used to control worms, keds and lice in and on sheep, originated from soil microbes/molecules is that considered an organic product.

There is a more organic and fun way to deal with external pests you get the family and neighbours together to pluck the parasites from fleeces and shorn sheep. It could get tedious after plucking and squashing thousands of nasty keds, but it's a cool social event, sort of like calf branding.

According regulations, organic requires unblemished, perfect. uncontaminated, parasite-free sheep. That would be a sheep that never gets sick and, is immune to diseases, internal and external parasites and can escape predators who might inflict untreatable nonorganic wounds. The super sheep that survive those health and lifethreatening calamities somehow produce supernatural organic wool. But if a sheep endures any of those stressful calamities, it will cause breaks in the wool fibres to appear.

Maybe that's how to check if wool is genuinely organic; just look for those breaks along with

brittle wool. The first things wool graders and judges look for in fleeces are breaks and brittle wool defects to determine quality levels. But who knew inferior and low-grade wool is now considered genuine organic and demands a premium. It would seem undamaged strong, long-fibered wool would be suspect if it were described as organic. It's similar to apples; they need worms, blight or scab to prove they're

organic. As with most organic products, certification is not robust or honest, as minimal laboratory testing is done to back up organic claims. I suspect testing wool for chemical traces would be a complex and costly laboratory exercise. Alleged organic guarantees boil down to dubious paper trails and trust, with growers basically purchasing certification from one of the myriad agencies with considerable annual

fees and logo royalties. The payoff for growing organic wool by the rules is that it should demand a high premium for the producer. I expect sheep producers who genuinely follow organic sheep rules would know that growing the perfect organic wool fleece is a costly exercise.

believe some producers honestly try to produce this type of unique wool, but quantity would be limited. What about market demand? Are there enough buyers that are prepared to pay, say \$50 a pound or more for raw organic fleece? That would return about \$500 for a wool-type sheep, not including the value of any lamb production. It's all enticing for the hardpressed sheep producer, as regular wool today returns only about \$5 to \$8 per fleece before shearing costs, and it's considered a nuisance money-losing byproduct. Shearing organic

wool must be seriously reevaluated as sheep shearing is considered cruelty animal vegetarian/animal rights zealots who are fellow travellers organic in the phantas magoria. Shearing is physically intrusive and mentally stressful for the sheep. It uses non-organic mechanical cutting weapons brandished by usually non-vegetarian shearers who violently remove wool fleeces from distraught sheep. There must be an organic way to get the fleece off the sheep without resorting to brute force. Maybe organic sheep can be sprayed with organic pixie dust from BC and the wool will just fall off magically and organically. Sounds like a much-needed organic

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Bassano food store targeted by rural thieves

A break-in at Bassano Family Foods that resulted in an \$11,000 loss on April 9 at 2:45 a.m. was the latest in a string of southern Alberta rural break-ins that took place between April 6 and 9.

"The suspects are rural Alberta targeting convenience stores, gas stations, cannabis stores, vape stores, sporting good stores, liquor stores and grocery stores," said RCMP Cpl. Gina Slaney, public information officer.

She said most cases involve suspects targeting cash, cigarettes and lottery scratch tickets, which were the items that were taken from the Bassano store.

RCMP and the forensic identification services obtained CCTV footage and

Police reported that no licence plate was obtained on a white Ford F-350 or Chev 3500 with a crew cab, cab lights and a black flat deck with a large wooden box on top, that was seen leaving the location heading east on Second Avenue.

Slaney reported that there have been various vehicles used throughout the course of the break and enters.

Both incidents involved three suspects all believed to be male and all had their faces covered.

The males in the Bassano incident are described as being thin built although one may be average built.

One of the suspects was wearing a black hooded sweater, black pants and a white belt, another was

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

As a child and teenager he enjoyed hiking in the surrounding mountains with his dog, likely named Rex, in the summers and tobogganing and pond skating with close friends in the winter. He excelled academically, receiving honor grades throughout school and delighted in drama presentations, de-bates and editing the school newspaper. Upon high school graduation he attended the University of Alberta for two years and began teaching at the age of twenty at Horace Allen Junior Senior High School and at Central Elementary School, teaching grade 6 Language at the latter to give the principal time for administration. With the construction of the Crowsnest Consolidated High School in 1970, he became senior Biology teacher at one point teaching four classes of Biology 30 and 6 classes of Biology 20. As school enrolments declined he also taught Physics, Psychology and locally developed grade 9 option courses (including Community Industries), and ran an archery and two astronomy, and rocketry clubs. Bob returned to school to complete his Masters in Education from the University of Alberta in 1974. In 1980, he moved to Hays, Alberta, to be the principal at Hays School, and to Brooks in 1981 where he took on the role of Deputy Chief Superintendent of Schools for the County of Newell, and then of Grasslands Public School Division from 1994 until his retirement in 2005. Bob was involved in many societies, boards and community projects, too many to list. Most recently he was involved in the Alberta Genealogy Society and had traced his lineage back to 400A.D. He was a published writer and an artist winning multiple awards throughout the Province for his pencil sketches and silverpoint drawings. Bob will be remembered for his wisdom, sense of humor, little walks (10km hikes through mountainous terrain), terrible dad jokes, stories and most importantly the love he had for his wife, children and grandchildren. His fondest memories include visits to his grandparents Hammer as a child and playing cards with them as an adult, writing to his Grandma (Emma) Franz, visits with his Aunt Irene and Uncle Fred Puchko, camping holidays and hiking explorations with family, playing cards and board games, private one-on-one conversations with Meghan and Kyle, playing trolls with Tayin, and spider with Violet, time spent jok-ing, laughing and the sense of humor of the extended family, walks with Grace and quiet time with the cats. Bob was predeceased by his mother, Marie Franz and father, Robert Franz Sr. He is survived by he wife, Grace Franz, son Kyle Franz, daughter Meghan (Jesse) Doherty, grandchildren Tayin Doherty and Violet Doherty, Aunt Mae Johnson and Aunt Eleanor Hammer. Civets are solitary, nocturnal animals. They live in tree hollows and rock crevices.

Although most civets live on the ground, some, like the Asian palm civet, are arboreal (meaning they live in trees). The Sunda otter civet, the African civet and the rare Congo water civet are semiaquatic.

Civets are omnivores and will eat just about anything, including small animals and vegetable matter. Many are fond of rodents and snakes.

Civet litters usually consist of two or three young.

Threatened species

Several civet species are in danger of extinction; among these are the Malabar civet of India and the Sunda otter civet, native to the Malay Peninsula, Sumatra and Borneo.

Coffee and perfume

Civets produce a thick, sticky secretion called civetone. This musky scent has been used for centuries in fancy perfumes. Today, most of the perfume industry uses a synthetic version of civetone.

The banded mongoose is found in the central and eastern parts of Africa. It lives in savannas, open forests and grasslands and feeds primarily on beetles and millipedes. It lives in colonies that travel and fight together

The mongoose

Mongooses live around four years in the wild and

up to 20 years in captivity.

There are 34 mongoose species; they live in Europe, Asia and Africa. These weasellike creatures can adapt to many habitats.

Mongooses range in size from the **dwarf mongoose** at 7 inches (18 cm) long to the Egyptian mongoose at 2 feet (60 cm) long.

Behavior

Mongooses are fast and agile carnivores (meat-eaters). They eat snakes, rodents, birds, frogs, insects and eggs. Like the otter, they use rocks as tools to crack the shells of eggs, or they throw eggs against a hard surface to break them. They sometimes eat nuts, fruits, roots, berries and seeds.

Mongooses are active during the day and sleep at night.

Some mongooses are solitary, but others, like the banded mongoose, live in large groups called packs, colonies or mobs. Packs can have up to 50 members.

Mongooses live in burrows or in trees. They rarely dig their own burrows, preferring to find abandoned burrows.

Mongooses have sharp, nonretractable claws, which they use to defend themselves.

Many mongoose species are immune to snakebite toxins.

Mongooses are vocal and chatter constantly. They will cry out to announce danger. Once a year, to attract a mate, they make high-pitched sounds called giggling.
