# **Residents say city** moving too fast choosing school site

couple of local Α residents say the city is moving too fast to provide a future school site in the Meadowbrook area.

Last Tuesday, the city council committee agreed to provide a letter of intent to Grasslands Public Schools for the land along 4th Avenue just south of the French school for a future elementary school.

The residents, who asked not to be identified, said the city is moving forward whether they want it or not. "I think it's decided

ahead of time," he said. They added that there has been a lot of development in the area including a 112unit apartment and now a public school near an established school.

"That's a lot of people on one block."

"I'm not very happy. When I first bought my house it wasn't zoned to have the school there. So now I'm looking at having my house depreciate," said one resident.

"You guys have rushed this through. I mean, you're pushing it through. You're doing it again, just like you did with the Catholic school," they said.

Hélène Émmell, chair of the Southern Francophone Education Region, said she is pleased that another

school may be constructed nearby and the Francophone Region would be open to sharing facilities.

She said there are plans starting for the field's design but they would like to involve Grasslands in the discussion.

"We need to have a conversation. We want to partner with the city and Grasslands," she said. The public school board

has included the future elementary school as their second priority in the 2026-2029 capital plan.

A letter of intent or land approval had to be submitted to the province by April 1.

The proposed public school along 4th Avenue East would be the first in an area of the city that is growing.

It could have a starting capacity of 450 students at the cost of \$26.925 million.

The school board's top priority is to return portables to Griffin Park School to accommodate growth and a complete modernization at the cost of \$21.137 million.

The city is expected to introduce a bylaw on April 7 to redesignate the 8.20 acres parcel on Meadowlake land from public recreation and open space to accommodate the school as a municipal reserve, school reserve or municipal and school reserve site.

Pace Solar has asked the Alberta Utilities Commission (AUC) to place their application for the Salt Flats project in Brooks in abeyance for three months.

"PACE had some additional field work done on the project site and is considering updating its layout," states a submission to the AUC by the company's lawyers.

The company is also considering further visual impacts pursuant to the Electric Energy Land Use and Visual Assessment Regulation.

If the application is approved it will mean that the four day oral hearing that was set to begin on April 14 would be cancelled.

A decision by the AUC is expected this week.

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



# Playoff games set to begin; Bandits will host West Kelowna

The Brooks Bandits will face the seventh place West Kelowna Warriors in the British Columbia Hockey League's first playoff round. In the final regular season home games the Bandits went 1-1.

The Warriors defeated the Trail Smoke Eaters 4-3 in overtime on Friday, their only game over the weekend.

Bandits goalie Griffin Wright, 18, who was recruited by the team in August played his first BCHL game on Friday when the team hosted the Spruce Grove Saints. Wright had 36 saves but they fell to the Saints in overtime.

Bandits goals were scored by Jace Letourneau, Dante Siciliano and Luke Bibby. At 4:11 of the overtime, Saints defenceman James Richards got the OT goal.

The Saints and Okotoks, which were separated by one point on Sunday, fought for the last spot in the Interior Conference.

On Saturday, Okotoks was defeated by the Bandits 7-3 in their second last regular season game, while the Saints, in their final regular season game, lost to Blackfalds 4-3.

The top eight teams to advance to the playoffs in

the Interior Conference are Penticton, Brooks, Trail, Salmon Arm, Sherwood Park, Cranbrook, West Kelowna and Okotoks.

The Coastal Conference looked much like the Interior on Sunday as Langley Rivermen and Prince George Spruce Kings were separated by two points.

In their final game on Friday, the Rivermen were defeated by Chilliwack Chiefs. On Sunday afternoon in Coastal Conference action the Spruce Kings defeated Powell River Kings 5-0 while in the Interior Conference Sherwood Park edged Okotoks 5-4.

The Coastal conference teams in the playoffs are Chilliwack, Surrey, Cowichan Valley, Victoria, Coquitlam, Nanaimo, Alberni Valley and Prince George.

# City wants to take \$100,000 from future federal funds

The estimated \$100,000 cost to install a small water park in a residential area has doubled.

"We're estimating that additional funds of another \$100,000 are required in 2025 to complete the project.

"The city's funds could be drawn from the city's 2025 Canada Community-Building Fund (CCBF)," Bryce Mackan, the city's manager of engineering, told city council committee last Tuesday.

"In 2024 when it came up in budget discussion, my understanding is that it would only proceed if there was \$100,000 in grant funding available for it," said councillor Ray Juska. He said that funding he expected would be grants from other sources.

"I'm fine with the funding on that," said mayor John Petrie.

"It's a good project for the area. Those things do enhance our community."

The 35-square metre water park would be installed West of Third Street West in Uplands.

Mackan said a large tank would be installed under the park to capture the water so it could be reused for the trees in the area but environmental rules need to be determined as to how it could be completed.

The park would be designed for children under the age of about 14 and would include six water features.

Waterplay has provided

a plan. As part of the Canoe procurement site it allows the city to directly award and start the project.

"It saves a lot of time on our processes," he said.

Businesses registered on Canoe have done the competitive bidding processes which saves time for municipalities to write, release and award tenders.

This year's CCBF allocation to the city is estimated at \$956,433 subject to authorization by the province.

the province. Roughly \$6 million of the fund was used to build a local internet service in Brooks.

The recreation committee is considering building additional small water parks throughout the community every second year.

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# COMMENT Here's why Mark Carney is the wrong man for Canada

Carney's policies and instincts would take Canada in the wrong direction as we deal with the economic threats from Washington

Mark Carney may have an impressive resume and career, but he is the wrong man at the wrong time for Canada.

Carney is currently running to become leader of the Liberal Party and, by extension, the prime minister of Canada – in part by saying his global experience makes him the man to face down U.S. President Donald Trump.

Prior to entering the Liberal leadership race, Carney was chairman of the board for Brookfield Asset Management company, a director for several large American corporations and bodies, and an advisor on climate change to the United Nations. Of course, he has also served as Governor of the Bank of England and of the Bank of Canada.

What matters though isn't his resume or credentials but what kind of policies Carney would bring in if he were PM – and this is where he fails.

Canada doesn't need to elect another environmental zealot who will handcuff our economy.

One of Carney's pet projects was the Glasgow Financial Alliance for Net Zero. The goal of the organization is to "support the transition to a net-zero economy" within the financial and asset management sectors.

This is the type of thinking that leads to large global banks like HSBC refusing to finance oil and gas projects which, like it or not, we're going to need for some time. HSBC was of course a member of Carney's pet project, but thankfully most of the major Canadian and American banks recently said they were quitting the alliance.

Stephen Guilbeault, currently Justin Trudeau's environment minister and now a backer of Carney, said in an interview this week that Carney would speed up Canada adopting this type of banking that will squeeze out the oil and gas sector.

Carney has been an opponent of Canadian pipelines like Northern Gateway and Energy East, both of which were killed by the Trudeau government, though he had no problem taking his multi-million dollar paycheque from Brookfield Asset Management even as they bought pipelines in other countries.

Canada is facing the double blow of Donald Trump's tariffs on Canadian goods and his attempt to restructure the American economy and global trading order.

To weather these coming changes we need to diversify, deregulate and unleash Canada's full potential, which means leaning heavily on the natural resources we have. This will mean more pipelines, more exploration, building export terminals for liquified natural gas, expanding mining operations, building refineries here.

Can the man who has spent the last several years advocating for a net-zero economy and moving away from fossil fuels really be believed to take on those tasks?

Carney's supporters will say his background in economics still makes him a better pick than Conservative Leader Pierre Poilievre. In an interview with the Globe and Mail published in March 2021, Carney was warning that the COVID pandemic and the government response to it would result in deflation.

His record at the Bank of England was mixed as well with complaints of him meddling in politics over Brexit when he was supposed to be neutral. He also faced criticism for printing too much money in the wake of Brexit and sending mixed signals on interest rates.

Maybe it was the fact that we were coming up on the 10th anniversary of the treaty Donald Trump destroyed that prompted him to start issuing threats to Iran again.

obscurely The treaty, named the Joint Plan of Comprehensive Action (JCPOA), was a deal in which Iran put its nuclear program on hold in return for all the major powers easing sanctions on the country. The treaty was a major accomplishment of Barack Obama's presidency, which may be why Donald Trump pulled the United States out three years later.

Iran had been scrupulously obeying the terms of the JCPOA, and none of the other signatories (China, France, Germany, Russia, and the United Kingdom) had any complaint about its behaviour. Trump, however, clamped strict trade sanctions back on Iran, which naturally responded by resuming its work on enriching uranium.

The Iranians claim that they are only enriching uranium for nuclear fuel and other peaceful uses, but nobody believes them. The experts say they must want at least a "nuclear threshold" capability, because nobody enriches nuclear fuel to 60 per cent uranium just to fuel power plants. The Iranians want at least the ability to build their own nukes fast in an emergency. What kind of emergency? Well, the Iranians know that there are Israeli and American nuclear weapons targeted on them, and currently they have no

nuclear weapons of their own. Getting them would no more prove that they plan to use them than it did when the Soviet Union, Britain, France, China, Israel, India, Pakistan and North Korea got them.

However, many other nuclear states see Iran as less eligible to have nuclear weapons because it is ruled by an elderly and fanatical religious elite that regularly issues blood-curdling threats to its numerous enemies. That was why they banded together to back the JCPOA treaty, but Trump trashed that and here we are.

Iran has used the past seven years to work away on its uranium enrichment project, first at a fairly leisurely pace but then more quickly as the prospect of another Trump regime loomed. Now they are almost there.

The International Atomic Energy Agency said last month that Iran has now stockpiled almost 275 kg of uranium enriched to 60 per cent purity, just short of weapons grade. The last step, to 90 per cent pure, is the easiest, and could be done in a few days or at most a few weeks.

That's enough fissile material for six nuclear bombs, although actually fabricating crude but effective nuclear bombs would probably take a further six months. If they want to put nuclear warheads on missiles, they could be looking at as much as two years.

Given how many Iranian missiles were intercepted or missed their targets in the past two rounds of fighting, however, Tehran might prefer not to put its precious warheads-to-be in the nose-cones of ballistic or cruise missiles. Trucks aren't a good bet for delivering across Israel's border either. Ships? Who knows? it get them. It does mean that potential target countries will be thinking that it might, and making their own plans to preempt that contingency if they can. It's definitely getting more dangerous.

None of this would be happening if Trump had just left the JCPOA alone. Iran would still be years and years away from nuclear weapons, and even Trump might settle for just negotiating another 10year term for the treaty.

But maybe not. Trump is very much under the influence of Israel's Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, who really does want the U.S. to attack Iran. (He'll even help.) And to make matters worse, the Iranian regime feels that it has its back to the wall.

Nationwide outbreaks of protest against the government of the ayatollahs are coming closer and closer together. The sanctions have crippled the economy and everybody is feeling the pinch. All of Iran's allies in the Arab world — Hezbollah in Lebanon, Hamas in Gaza, the Assad regime in Syria, even the Houthis in Yemen — are being stripped away.

And Donald Trump seems to think that he can retrieve his original blunder (not that he admits it was a blunder) by writing a letter to Grand Ayatollah Ali Khamenei. He gave the Supreme Leader two months to negotiate a new nuclear deal or the U.S. and Israel will strike Iran's nuclear facilities.

This is typical Trump stuff: set very tight deadlines, demand unrealistic terms, and threaten 'Hell' if the deadline is not met. It generally doesn't work well, especially when you're dealing with fanatics. We have the makings of a really nasty war here, possible including a local nuclear war or (if Iran's nukes are still not ready) at least a "dirty" bomb or two.

One Labour MP famously gave Carney the nickname of "the unreliable boyfriend" in 2014 and it stuck.

Carney may have an impressive resume but he has the wrong policies for what Canada needs now. We don't need another leader tied to net-zero, no-growth policies that will keep our resources in the ground and stop infrastructure like pipelines to tidewater being built.

To deal with Donald Trump, we should ask what would Mark Carney do and then do the opposite.

None of this speculation means that Iran is planning to use nuclear weapons on Israel (or anywhere else) as soon as

Alcoma School News-



In Romans we read that we are to outdo one another in showing honor (9:10). What does it mean to show honor? When we assume the best



I am sure we differ on some theological points, but I value the contribution to kingdom of God made by each one. Different churches could learn from one another, we have different strengths. We don't have to agree about everything to honor one another. Are we secure in what we believe enough to treat others with kindness? That is the way God is... If you see a pastor, thank them for what they do (even if you go to a different church). Pray for them. Encourage them. Jesus is coming back for one bride, and I think we are wise to leave the judgment to Him as to who is a part of it and who is not.



# Brooks man ordered to add name to sexual offender registry

### SANDRA M STANWAY BROOKS BULLETIN

Adil Musa, 58, was ordered to remain in custody for an additional 36 days, will have to provide his DNA and will have to register on the sex offenders registry for 10 years after pleading guilty to numerous charges including sexual contact with a child.

Musa's convictions included being unlawfully in a home, in possession of bank, credit and other identification cards that were not his, damaging a window in the police detachment, stealing a bike and a cellphone as well as being at places where he was not supposed to be. His most serious offence

occurred on May 11, 2023 at 5:26 p.m. when Musa approached an 11-year-old child in a public location and forced a kiss on her lips. He was arrested and later released.

A week later, after being ordered to not be within 100 metres of places where there are youth under the age of 18, he was found in the JBS Centre's pool area. The centre is near two schools.

Defence sought a 114 day time served sentence

but the court handed him a global sentence of 150 days in custody, however, he had served 120 days for pre-trial custody.

In addition to providing DNA and SOIRA (sexual offender information registration act) registration for 10 years, he was placed on probation for 18 months during which time he is not to have any contact with the victim, must remain at least 100m from any location where children would likely be such as a park and he cannot be in any place where there are children unless an adult is present at all times.

Road users should remain




vigilant, follow traffic laws and practice courtesy to ensure everyone's safety.



As expected, long-time anti-Canadian cattle/ beef trade extremist lobby group R-CALF USA was applauding President Trump's on-again/off-again 25% tariffs on Canadian cattle and beef imports. Gloating by R-CALF is no surprise; tariffs on beef imports was the reason R-CALF was originally created. R-CALF is notorious for creating mind-numbing, twisted analytical market presumptions to rationalize how imports are the source of all evil whenever cattle prices are down. Even when cattle prices reach new highs they pontificate that prices would be higher if it weren't for imports.

It's a somewhat simplistic approach,

# **R-CALF celebrates Trump tariffs ....** fast food giants may not be so happy

but it appeals to their membership base. No mention is ever made in R-CALF propaganda that the US exports beef, which results in \$400 of extra returns on slaughter cattle. However, you can expect howls of outraged protest from R-CALF if Canada imposes reciprocal tariffs on US beef and cattle imports. But that's okay, cattle producers in the US, as in Canada, have every right to have their own alternative opinions on issues of the day.

Steve Dittmer, the distinguished editor Agribusiness of the Freedom Foundation publication, the AFF masterfully Sentinel, eviscerates the R-CALF position on beef imports. Dittmer is known for his free-market approach to the cattle business and has little time for duplicitous folks who want to create barriers to that business. In his article, he points out

that most beef imports into the US is hamburger meat from NZ, AUS and Canada. The reason is that the US beef industry alone cannot satisfy the American consumers' insatiable demand for hamburger. Imports are also needed to keep the price of fast-food hamburgers as low as possible.

Cheap hamburgers are the marketing base for many fast-food chains in North America. Sure, you can grind expensive steaks and roasts into hamburger meat, but that would result in \$20 hamburgers and put the big chains out of business. Trump tariffs against hamburger imports will also have a price increase impact. MacDonalds, Wendys and others are the biggest beef buyers in the world; they and their customers would lose their minds if that were to happen. But that is what R-CALF is advocating with their

tariff war against beef imports. Much of the Trump and Republican voting base will tolerate tariff-related price increases, but they won't tolerate \$20 hamburgers for very long.

The US does have a way to keep hamburger prices low even with the loss of Canadian hamburger imports; Trump can hamburger exempt from AUS, NZ and South America. Those countries would jump at the chance to increase exports to the US and would probably see higher prices to take advantage of any increased demand. If Trump tariffs apply to all hamburger imports, it will see unwelcome higher prices for the average American hamburger consumer.

My guess is that Trump will exempt hamburger tariffs on all imports except for Canada. The only hope is will he stick to his new buzzword that tariffs will be reciprocal

that would exempt Canadian beef and cattle as there are no tariffs under CUSMA. But then, with Trump, everything is always up in the air. As Steve Dittmer stated, the US has to import hamburger because it doesn't produce enough

of that popular product. In Canada, we are in a similar situation regarding high hamburger demand, but in relation to the US, we produce an excess of beef per capita. That means Canada has enough hamburger and exports the excess to higherpriced US markets for US dollars. Canada then imports cheap grinding beef from AUS, NZ and South America to produce least-cost hamburgers favoured by chains like A&W. I should mention that MacDonalds takes pride in using only 100% Canadian hamburger. If Trump tariffs are imposed on Canadian hamburger exported to

the US, those exports will need to find a new home back in Canada, which may displace cheap imports.

Back to R-CALF, I note it has expanded its lobby business by advocating tariffs on lamb imports from NZ and AUS. I guess it increases its donor base, but it's a hopeless cause. The US supplies less than 40% of their lamb market; the rest must be imported. I learned many years ago that no matter the tariff, AUS and NZ are price takers and need hard currency at any price to purchase other imports. The AUS and NZ dollars are not used in international trade, hence their need for US dollars. Lamb imports will never stop unless there is a 100% tariff against Oceanic lamb.



# City approves minimal donation for rodeo

### SANDRA M STANWAY BROOKS BULLETIN

A request to the city from the Koye Larson Memorial Fund to donate the rental of the Centennial Regional Arena was denied, however a smaller donation was approved.

The total donation would have been \$9,560 for the facility and staff time.

City council committee approved \$3,700 to cover the costs of the installation and removal of the decking on the ice surface and the event set.

The urgency to get the arena and ice surface cleared and cleaned is that the rodeo will be held on May 9, the same time as the British Columbia Hockey League's playoff season.

If the Bandits advance, they may host games on the same weekend.

Mayor John Petrie said the city has donated to non-profit groups but was hesitant to donate to the for profit Professional Bull Riders Association (PBR) which will host the event. Petrie said while the event proceeds are donated to non-profit organizations, a donation from the city would indirectly be a donation to the PBR.

"I'm a little queasy on giving a big donation like this to the PBR which is a big organization," he said.

"You would not be remotely giving them money. It would be directly to our fund," said Katie Cowie, representing the PBR and the Koye Larson Fund.

The proposed budget for the event includes \$150,000 for the PBR and \$62,000 for entertainer David Lee Murphy.

The goal is to contribute \$50,000 to non-profit organizations which would be an increase of \$30,000 over last year.

"We pay the PBR their fee, so you would not be supporting them. You would be supporting the community," Cowie said.

When asked by council if either the PBR or David Lee Murphy have any skin in the game, Cowie said they don't. "We sure tried...PBR's are typically not put on as a charity event. They're more revenue generators."

"This is a business event and they should be the ones that are donating it back to both of you instead of the taxpayer and that's what we have to worry about here. That's our main goal," said Petrie.

Last year taxpayers were upset when the city purchased poly and plywood to protect the arena ice surface at the cost of \$30,000.

"My fear is that there's now going to be bigger backlash of doing this. We went through a lot of heat last year," said councillor Joel Goodnough.

"I know it's a community building but we also have to raise enough capital for it to take care of depreciating assets in the building. If we don't do that the taxpayer funds it," said Petrie.

Petrie suggested to Cowie that she seek donations from the Murphy and the PBR.

"Then you got your cost covered," he said.
